

Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **10,583** contacts with Mason County families during 2007-2008.<sup>1</sup>

### **Our People**

The 2000 U.S. Census reported total population as **16,800**.<sup>2</sup> The graph below indicates the percentage by age group.

### Spotlight on . . .

## Securing Financial Stability



Mason County has comparatively low unemployment, but a high percentage of individuals below the poverty level. Due to our area's high use of credit, merchandise rental businesses, check cashing services, and Master Commissioner Sales, the Mason County Extension volunteers and Extension staff used the Money Crunch and Small Steps to Health and Wealth curricula to assist individuals and families with financial security. A phone survey of participants found 80% reported improving financial management skills including making a budget or spending plan. All participants reached confirmed becoming aware of the importance of starting to save and invest early in life and have identified personal or family investment goals.1

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#### **Our Families**

Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Mason County families can be described as follows:<sup>2</sup>

- 4,743 families reside in the county.
- 610 families (12.9%) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is \$37,257.
- **140** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.

According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, **3,264** people in Mason County receive food stamps. The average family food stamp benefit is **\$222.32** per month.<sup>3</sup>

In the county, **34** children live in out-of-home care.<sup>4</sup> In 2004, there were **5** incidents of adult abuse and **27** incidents of child abuse.<sup>5</sup>

# As a result of participation in Mason County Extension programs:<sup>1</sup>

- **50** people increased their knowledge and skills related to parenting and personal relationships.
- 27 adult, dependent, and child care providers increased their care giving knowledge.
- 236 people used safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.
- 100% of food stamp recipients or eligible recipients enrolled in the nutrition education program improved their diet.

### **Our Community**

Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In September 2008, the rate of unemployment in Mason County was **6.8%**. This represented a **51%** increase from the September 2007 level of **4.5%**.

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community well-being. In Mason County, **2.35%** of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and 60-day bank card delinquency rates have increased by **28%**. In a six-month period (May through October 2008), **20** foreclosures were filed.

Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Mason County, **14%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.<sup>9</sup>


# As a result of participation in Mason County Extension programs:<sup>1</sup>

- **62** people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- **209** adults or youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- 128 adults and youth utilized improved communication, problem solving, and group process skills to address community needs.

# As a result of participation in Mason County Extension programs:<sup>1</sup>

- 38 people increased their use of radon testers, smoke detectors, fire extinguishers, and other devices to ensure personal safety.
- 222 people made lifestyle changes to improve physical health.
- **1,231** people implemented new practices to maintain their health and well-being.
