



SPOTLIGHT ON...

PROMOTING HEALTHY HOMES AND COMMUNITIES

n recognition that community infrastructures have an impact on our health, Family and Consumer Sciences (FCS) Extension implemented the "Second Sunday" event. It was designed to increase our community's awareness about the importance of physical activity and healthy living. The FCS agent collaborated with several community leaders and partners. Over 140 people of all ages including groups of friends, neighbors, and church groups participated in walking, biking, and pushing strollers on the closed section of KY 439 and Indian Drive. The distance was

about 4 miles roundtrip. 95% finished the whole walk. **Participants** were provided with fresh fruit and water throughout the event. One participant told us, "Wish there were more events like this with safe places to walk."1





OUR COMMUNITY

► Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In August 2009, the rate of unemployment in Adair County was 10.8%.³

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community well-being. In Adair County,

As a result of participation in Adair County Extension programs:¹

- 52 people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- 177 people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- 367 people expanded their knowledge of economic development.


1.86% of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and 60-day bank card delinquency rates have increased by **1.22%**.⁴ In a one-year period (October 2008 through October 2009), **21** foreclosures were filed.⁵

Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Adair County, **21%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.⁶

OUR HEALTH

▶ The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Adair County.

Figure 2. Health Risks.6




As a result of participation in Adair County Extension programs:

- **335** people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- **500** people implemented new practices to maintain health and well-being.
- **400** people increased their use of radon testers, smoke detectors, fire extinguishers, and other devices to ensure personal safety.

OUR FAMILIES

- ▶ Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Adair County families can be described as follows:²
- 4,801 families reside in the county.
- 870 families (18.2%) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is \$29,779.
- **180** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, 1,255 people in Adair County receive food stamps. The average family food stamp benefit is \$196.69 per month.⁷

In the county, 41 children live in out-of-home care.8

In 2005, there were **32** incidents of adult abuse and **49** incidents of child abuse.⁹

As a result of participation in Adair County Extension programs:¹

- 520 adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions
- 395 people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- **200** people increased their knowledge and skills related to parenting and personal relationships.
