



Figure 1. Population by Age Group² (n=5,162)






SPOTLIGHT ON...

EMPOWERING COMMUNITY LEADERS

arlisle County Extension Homemakers are an important resource for the community. A key mission is to develop leadership skills through their regular county council meetings and club meetings. They supply a majority of the workers at the county fair in the exhibits building, followed by cooking and selling funnel cakes, apple dews and tater twists at the fair to raise money for community outreach and scholarships. An annual leadership event is the County Annual meeting, complete with cultural arts display. They also sponsored the Holiday

Foods tasting program to teach healthy meal planning for the holidays. Additionally, the members taught local youth quick clothing repair skills to stretch their clothes budget.1





OUR COMMUNITY

► Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In August 2009, the rate of unemployment in Carlisle County was 10.4%.³

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community wellbeing. In Carlisle

As a result of participation in Carlisle County Extension programs:¹


- 5 people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- 2 people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- Carlisle County Extension is involved in 9 community coalitions.

County, **2.99%** of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and 60-day bank card delinquency rates have increased by **1.45%**. In a one-year period (October 2008 through October 2009), **4** foreclosures were filed. ⁵

Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Carlisle County, **15%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.⁶

OUR HEALTH

► The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Carlisle County. Figure 2. Health Risks.⁶




As a result of participation in Carlisle County Extension programs:¹

- **100** people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- **16** people increased knowledge of safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.
- 15 people used safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.

OUR FAMILIES

- ▶ Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Carlisle County families can be described as follows:²
- 1,575 families reside in the county.
- 166 families (10.5%) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is \$33,433.
- **36** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, **264** people in Carlisle County receive food stamps. The average family food stamp benefit is **\$197.89** per month.⁷

In the county, 5 children live in out-of-home care.⁸

In 2005, there were **7** incidents of adult abuse and **14** incidents of child abuse.⁹

As a result of participation in Carlisle County Extension programs:¹

- 10 people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- **66** adults and youth improved practical living skills.
- 16 youth gained on or more life skills.
