



Figure 1. Population by Age Group<sup>2</sup> (n=7,752)






### SPOTLIGHT ON...

### ACCESSING NUTRITIOUS FOOD

he Fulton County Nutrition Education Program taught 36 limited-resource families how to serve more nutritious meals, to keep foods safe and to utilize local food resources effectively. Of those families, 100 percent reported making improvements in the nutritional quality of their diets. In addition, 51 percent of those families said they consumed a higher quality diet because they planned meals using the My Pyramid food guide, considered healthy choices and used the Nutrition Facts label. Eighteen percent of the families we served said they began feeding their children breakfast, 27 percent

demonstrated an improvement in safe food handling practices and hand washing behavior, and 32 percent learned to plan meals ahead of time and use a grocery list to guide their food selections.<sup>1</sup>





#### **OUR COMMUNITY**

► Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In August 2009, the rate of unemployment in Fulton County was 14.4%.<sup>3</sup>

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community well-being. In Fulton County, **0.86%** of mortgages are 90-days

# As a result of participation in Fulton County Extension programs:<sup>1</sup>


- 16 people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- 1 person was involved in working with government in addressing significant community issues.
- Fulton County Extension is involved in 2 community coalitions.

delinquent and 60-day bank card delinquency rates have increased by **0.45**%.<sup>4</sup> In a one-year period (October 2008 through October 2009), **21** foreclosures were filed.<sup>5</sup>

Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Fulton County, **17%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.<sup>6</sup>

### **OUR HEALTH**

► The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Fulton County. *Figure 2. Health Risks.*<sup>6</sup>




### As a result of participation in Fulton County Extension programs:<sup>1</sup>

- **331** people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- 181 people made lifestyle changes to improve health.
- **500** people increased knowledge of safe practices to store.

### **OUR FAMILIES**

- ► Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Fulton County families can be described as follows:<sup>2</sup>
- 2,115 families reside in the county.
- 424 families (20.1%) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is \$30,788.
- **102** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, 936 people in Fulton County receive food stamps. The average family food stamp benefit is \$183.43 per month.<sup>7</sup>

In the county, 13 children live in out-of-home care.8

In 2005, there were **39** incidents of adult abuse and **44** incidents of child abuse.<sup>9</sup>

# As a result of participation in Fulton County Extension programs:<sup>1</sup>

- 274 adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- 250 people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- 24 adults and youth improved practical living skills.
