### **OUR FOCUS**





Figure 1. Population by Age Group<sup>2</sup> (n=37,028)





### NURTURING FAMILIES

he inability to efficiently use what's on hand or to have access to the appropriate resources prevents some families from being able to provide the basics for their families. To combat this problem, Family and Consumer Sciences (FCS) agents throughout Kentucky work collaboratively with family resource coordinators, community and adult education leaders and Extension Homemakers to provide educational opportunities and activities to these families. One such opportunity in Graves County was the "Make and Take Workshop" for Head Start families. A total of 48 participants, including children, learned to make a variety of simple and inexpensive gifts to take home to share with family and friends.

The FCS agent also collaborated on a "Home Canning Basics 101" workshop at the Graves County Middle School. Fourteen people, including two men, participated.<sup>1</sup>





#### **OUR COMMUNITY**

► Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In August 2009, the rate of unemployment in Graves County was 10.9%.<sup>3</sup>

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community well-being. In Graves


- 407 people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- 555 people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- 277 people expanded their knowledge of economic development.

County, **1.22%** of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and 60-day bank card delinquency rates have increased by **1.12%**.<sup>4</sup> In a one-year period (October 2008 through October 2009), **71** foreclosures were filed.<sup>5</sup>

Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Graves County, **15**% of the people under age 65 are uninsured.<sup>6</sup>

### **OUR HEALTH**

➤ The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Graves County. Figure 2. Health Risks.<sup>6</sup>




### As a result of participation in Graves County Extension programs:<sup>1</sup>

- **687** people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- 232 people made lifestyle changes to improve health.
- **155** people increased knowledge of safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.

### **OUR FAMILIES**

- ► Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Graves County families can be described as follows:<sup>2</sup>
- 10,562 families reside in the county.
- 1,393 families (13.1%) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is \$38,054.
- **297** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, **2,321** people in Graves County receive food stamps. The average family food stamp benefit is **\$213.67** per month.<sup>7</sup>

In the county, 111 children live in out-of-home care.8

In 2005, there were **155** incidents of adult abuse and **99** incidents of child abuse.<sup>9</sup>

# As a result of participation in Graves County Extension programs:<sup>1</sup>

- 340 adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- 25 people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- 200 people increased their knowledge and skills related to parenting and personal relationships.
