

# ACCESSING NUTRITIOUS FOOD

ne spin-off of the economic recession and rising food prices is a double-digit increase in the percentage of home gardeners planting their own food. As a result of this increased interest in home gardening, the Harlan County Agriculture and Natural Resource agent, along with the Family and Consumer Sciences agent, developed the "Gardening 101" program. They presented the program in four locations, including the Harlan County Extension Depot, with 112 people on hand to get up-to-date information on gardening and food preservation from the University of Kentucky. This represents a 56-percent gain in attendance from the previous year's gardening program. What's more, 33 percent

were first-time participants in an Extension program. Each attendee received a packet of information and was taught to make stir-fry and vegetable pizza from the produce.<sup>1</sup>





### OUR COMMUNITY

Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In August 2009, the rate of unemployment in Harlan County was 12.8%.<sup>3</sup>

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community well-being. In Harlan


- **100** people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- **1,500** people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- **45** people expanded their knowledge of economic development.

County, **3.44%** of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and 60-day bank card delinquency rates have increased by **1.55%**.<sup>4</sup> In a one-year period (October 2008 through October 2009), **43** foreclosures were filed.<sup>5</sup>

Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Harlan County, **20%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.<sup>6</sup>

## OUR HEALTH



#### As a result of participation in Harlan County Extension programs:<sup>1</sup>

- **4,540** people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- **710** people increased knowledge of safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.
- **1,750** people increased their use of radon testers, smoke detectors, fire extinguishers, and other devices to ensure personal safety.

# OUR FAMILIES

- ► Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Harlan County families can be described as follows:<sup>2</sup>
- 9,446 families reside in the county.
- 2,737 families (29.1%) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is **\$23,536**.
- **401** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, **4,444** people in Harlan County receive food stamps. The average family food stamp benefit is **\$211.46** per month.<sup>7</sup>

In the county, **64** children live in out-of-home care.<sup>8</sup>

In 2005, there were **118** incidents of adult abuse and **147** incidents of child abuse.<sup>9</sup>

#### As a result of participation in Harlan County Extension programs:<sup>1</sup>

- **2,550** adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- **130** people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- **195** people increased their knowledge and skills related to parenting and personal relationships.
