



SPOTLIGHT ON...

ACCESSING NUTRITIOUS FOOD

W ith higher food prices in evidence, people are becoming more interested in home gardening and food preservation. To address this interest, the Henderson County Family and Consumer Sciences agent and assistant offered a food preservation workshop with an emphasis on food safety. Forty people – most of whom had never canned before – attended and received up-to-date information on canning, freezing and drying foods. They worked in groups to make salsa and jelly and canned green beans. A follow-up evaluation showed that 80 percent of participants have canned since the

class, with the remaining 20 percent indicating they plan to do so. As a result of renewed interest in canning, we reintroduced the open canning category at the Henderson County Fair. Seventy-five canning entries were exhibited.¹





OUR COMMUNITY

Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In August 2009, the rate of unemployment in Henderson County was 9.7%.3

Mortgage and bank card delinguency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community wellbeing. In Henderson

As a result of participation in Henderson County **Extension programs:**¹


- 50 people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- 57 people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- 306 people were prepared to enter the work force.

County, 2.65% of mortgages are 90-days delinguent and 60-day bank card delinguency rates have increased by **1.67%.**⁴ In a one-year period (October 2008 through October 2009), 116 foreclosures were filed.⁵

Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Henderson County, 12% of the people under age 65 are uninsured.⁶

OUR HEALTH

The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Henderson County. Figure 2. Health Risks.6




As a result of participation in Henderson County Extension programs:¹

- 342 people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- 495 people used safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.
- 200 people implemented practices to maintain health and well-being.

OUR FAMILIES

- Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Henderson County families can be described as follows:²
- 12,570 families reside in the county.
- 1,218 families (9.7%) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is \$44,703.
- 443 grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, 2,758 people in Henderson County receive food stamps. The average family food stamp benefit is **\$216.18** per month.7

In the county, **54** children live in out-of-home care.8

In 2005, there were **251** incidents of adult abuse and 206 incidents of child abuse.9

As a result of participation in Henderson County Extension programs:¹

- 3 adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- **30** people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- 430 adults and youth improved practical living skills.
