



NURTURING FAMILIES

he 2005 U.S. Census Bureau Survey of Income and Program Participation shows that 89 percent of children under age 5 whose mothers are employed are in some type of regular child care arrangement. About 30 percent are cared for in organized facilities such as day care centers. To ensure that providers in such facilities are knowledgeable about proper child care methods and practices, they are state-mandated to engage in 15 hours of training with a certified provider. The Family and Consumer Sciences agents from Jackson and Knox counties, both certified providers, partnered to offer that train-

ing to personnel at 20 child care organizations. Ninety participants attended a minimum of three hours training. In a follow-up evaluation, 80 percent reported an increased knowledge on the topics.¹





OUR COMMUNITY

Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In August 2009, the rate of unemployment in Jackson County was 17.8%.³

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community wellbeing. In Jackson County, **3.68%** of


- 23 people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- **3** people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- **5** people expanded their knowledge of economic development.

mortgages are 90-days delinquent and 60-day bank card delinquency rates have increased by **1.74%**.⁴ In a one-year period (October 2008 through October 2009), **34** foreclosures were filed.⁵

Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Jackson County, **19%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.⁶

OUR HEALTH

► The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Jackson County. *Figure 2. Health Risks.*⁶




As a result of participation in Jackson County Extension programs:¹

- **290** people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- **325** people used safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.
- **110** people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR FAMILIES

- ▶ Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Jackson County families can be described as follows:²
- 3,953 families reside in the county.
- 1,022 families (25.8%) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is **\$23,638**.
- **181** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, **1,878** people in Jackson County receive food stamps. The average family food stamp benefit is **\$204.68** per month.⁷

In the county, **63** children live in out-of-home care.⁸

In 2005, there were **76** incidents of adult abuse and **45** incidents of child abuse.⁹

As a result of participation in Jackson County Extension programs:¹

- **60** people increased their knowledge and skills related to parenting and personal relationships.
- **160** adult or child care providers increased their knowledge and skills related to age appropriate care.
- **250** adults and youth improved practical living skills.
