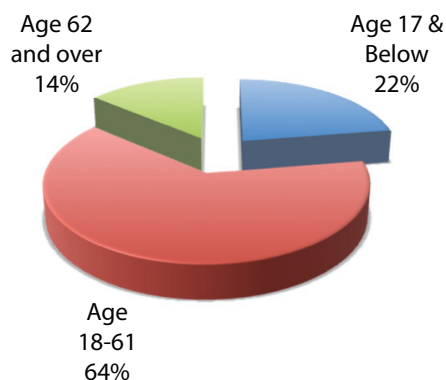

**SPOTLIGHT ON...**

EMPOWERING COMMUNITY LEADERS

Agricultural diversification goes far beyond sowing different crops in Johnson County. Beginning on Route 201, eight agricultural-related businesses were assembled to create an agri-tourism “loop.” The loop, which branches off Country Music Highway 23, a National Scenic Byway, creates a delightful agricultural adventure for the tourist, with farm and home antiques and opportunities for fishing, grinding corn, feeding cattle, picking fresh vegetables, purchasing locally made herb-filled soaps, tasting homemade jams and jellies, eating a meal prepared from locally produced food and listening to local musicians. After field testing the project with 50 participants, the reviews were excellent. Each participating site has since reported increased visibility, local interest, sales and tour groups. One site reported record-breaking attendance and sales this year.¹



OUR COMMUNITY

► Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In August 2009, the rate of unemployment in Johnson County was **11.5%**.³

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community well-being. In Johnson County, **2.39%** of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and 60-day bank card delinquency rates have increased by **2.47%**.⁴ In a one-year period (October 2008 through October 2009), **29** foreclosures were filed.⁵

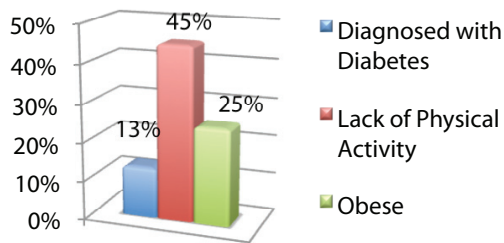
Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Johnson County, **16%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.⁶

As a result of participation in Johnson County Extension programs:¹

- **115** people were involved in addressing issues of their community
- **145** people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- **60** people expanded their knowledge of economic development.

OUR HEALTH

► The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Johnson County. **Figure 2. Health Risks.**⁶



As a result of participation in Johnson County Extension programs:¹

- **635** people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- **310** people increased knowledge of safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.
- **500** people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR FAMILIES

► Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Johnson County families can be described as follows:²

- **6,867** families reside in the county.
- **1,491** families (**21.7%**) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is **\$29,142**.
- **270** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, **2,664** people in Johnson County receive food stamps. The average family food stamp benefit is **\$204.10** per month.⁷

In the county, **31** children live in out-of-home care.⁸

In 2005, there were **76** incidents of adult abuse and **193** incidents of child abuse.⁹

As a result of participation in Johnson County Extension programs:¹

- **135** adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- **210** people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- **600** adults and youth improved practical living skills.
