

MAKING BENEFICIAL LIFESTYLE CHOICES

eslie County Extension partnered with the Leslie County Board of Education to offer the "Literacy, Eating and Activity for Primary (LEAP)" curriculum to 336 students in kindergarten through third grade and in two Head Start classes. Our Family and Consumer Sciences agent and Nutrition Education Program assistant visited schools once a month for six months to read a story that introduced nutritious foods. During the visits, each student engaged in some type of physical activity and tasted a healthy snack that related to the book read in that session. At the end, 100 percent of the participants learned the importance of hand washing, physical activity, and brushing teeth and had tried at least one new food.¹

OUR COMMUNITY

Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In August 2009, the rate of unemployment in Leslie County was 14.4%.³

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community well-being. In Leslie County,

As a result of participation in Leslie County Extension programs:¹


- **80** people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- 201 people were prepared to enter the work force.
- **140** people expanded their knowledge of economic development.

0.61% of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and 60-day bank card delinquency rates have increased by **1.69%**.⁴ In a one-year period (October 2008 through October 2009), **10** foreclosures were filed.⁵

Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Leslie County, **18%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.⁶

OUR HEALTH

► The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Leslie County. *Figure 2. Health Risks.*⁶




As a result of participation in Leslie County Extension programs:¹

- **550** people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- **425** people increase knowledge of safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.
- **100** people implemented practices to maintain health and well-being.

OUR FAMILIES

- ► Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Leslie County families can be described as follows:²
- 3,668 families reside in the county.
- 1,121 families (30.2%) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is **\$22,225**.
- **126** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, **1,948** people in Leslie County receive food stamps. The average family food stamp benefit is **\$192.54** per month.⁷

In the county, **48** children live in out-of-home care.⁸

In 2005, there were **25** incidents of adult abuse and **64** incidents of child abuse.⁹

As a result of participation in Leslie County Extension programs:¹

- **55** adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- **54** people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- **44** people increased their knowledge and skills related to parenting and personal relationships.
