OUR FOCUS





SPOTLIGHT ON...

MAKING BENEFICIAL LIFESTYLE CHOICES

o help combat obesity, the Lincoln County Family and Consumer Sciences program partnered with the Lincoln County Health Department to offer two sessions of "Weight, The Reality Series," a program that empowers individuals to make healthy lifestyle changes and establish habits that will improve their overall health and wellness. Both eightweek sessions focused on helping participants set goals for losing weight and featured weekly weighins, nutrition education and a variety of exercise activities, including strength training, stretching and flexibility. Thirty-two people of varying ages attended. Ninety-three percent lost weight, with an average

of 6.28 pounds per person. One participant lost 27 pounds. Additionally, 85% reported drinking more water, 76% reported measuring and controlling portions, 76% reported keeping a record of their eating habits.¹





OUR COMMUNITY

► Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In August 2009, the rate of unemployment in Lincoln County was 12.8%.³

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community wellbeing. In Lincoln

As a result of participation in Lincoln County Extension programs:


- 275 people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- **600** people were prepared to enter the work force.
- **1,200** people expanded their knowledge of economic development.

County, **3.70%** of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and 60-day bank card delinquency rates have increased by **2.69%**.⁴ In a one-year period (October 2008 through October 2009), **2** foreclosures were filed.⁵

Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Lincoln County, **16%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.⁶

OUR HEALTH

► The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Lincoln County. *Figure 2. Health Risks.*⁶




As a result of participation in Lincoln County Extension programs:¹

- **735** people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- **525** people increase knowledge of safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.
- **265** people implemented practices to maintain health and well-being.

OUR FAMILIES

- ▶ Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Lincoln County families can be described as follows:²
- 6,732 families reside in the county.
- 1,107 families (16.4%) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is \$32,284.
- **188** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, 1,913 people in Lincoln County receive food stamps. The average family food stamp benefit is \$215.79 per month.⁷

In the county, **95** children live in out-of-home care.⁸

In 2005, there were **110** incidents of adult abuse and **95** incidents of child abuse.⁹

As a result of participation in Lincoln County Extension programs:¹

- 3,250 adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- **75** people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- 100 people increased their knowledge and skills related to parenting and personal relationships.
