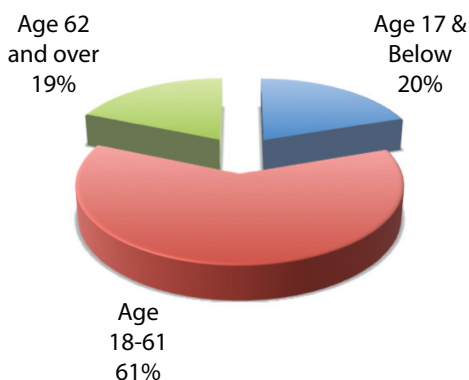

SPOTLIGHT ON...

EMPOWERING COMMUNITY LEADERS

Membership in Extension's Homemakers provides Marshall Countians with a support network and a recognizable leadership entity in the community. Members acquire skills through monthly educational sessions and meetings, where they learn teaching strategies to be shared with family and friends. Leaders have used skills to teach hands-on programs on a variety of topics. Thirty-five members serve as mentors and 30 members of one club have targeted Head Start parents and children as beneficiaries of the family literacy program. In addition, volunteers have donated over \$6,000 in books and reading resources to Head Start classrooms. As a result of this program, families report increased reading activities in their homes. At the Homemakers' state meeting, our members were recognized for contributing more than 105,500 hours in teaching activities and community service.¹



OUR COMMUNITY

► Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In August 2009, the rate of unemployment in Marshall County was **11.1%**.³

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community well-being. In Marshall County, **1.64%** of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and 60-day bank card delinquency rates have increased by **1.64%**.⁴ In a one-year period (October 2008 through October 2009), **112** foreclosures were filed.⁵

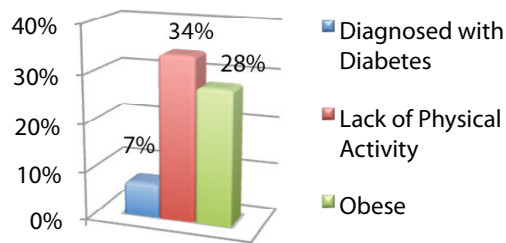
Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Marshall County, **11%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.⁶

As a result of participation in Marshall County Extension programs:¹

- **55** people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- **56** people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- Marshall County Extension is involved in **8** community coalitions.

OUR HEALTH

► The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Marshall County. **Figure 2. Health Risks.**⁶



As a result of participation in Marshall County Extension programs:¹

- **528** people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- **166** people increase knowledge of safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.
- **23** people implemented practices to maintain health and well-being.

OUR FAMILIES

► Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Marshall County families can be described as follows:²

- **8,993** families reside in the county.
- **593** families (**6.6%**) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is **\$43,670**.
- **282** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, **1,511** people in Marshall County receive food stamps. The average family food stamp benefit is **\$204.82** per month.⁷

In the county, **124** children live in out-of-home care.⁸

In 2005, there were **95** incidents of adult abuse and **74** incidents of child abuse.⁹

As a result of participation in Marshall County Extension programs:¹

- **160** adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- **27** people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- **30** adult or child care providers increased their knowledge and skills related to age appropriate care.
