



MAKING BENEFICIAL LIFESTYLE CHOICES

ncidence rates for diabetes, cardiovascular disease and cancer rank above the state average for citizens of Mason County. Our Extension program, Family and Consumer Sciences Council and Homemakers work together to educate and encourage healthy lifestyles by offering health education opportunities, early detection, screening and prevention. We collaborated with other civic groups to conduct two blood drives, a regional health fair, KEEP screening, Women's Health Registry promotion, a regional diabetes fair, mammogram screenings and other events. As a result, 1,058 individuals received screenings, blood tests, counseling and information at an

estimated total cost savings of nearly \$300,000. One uninsured participant reported that her results indicated some potential life-threatening health issues, and she is now seeking care with a specialist.¹





OUR COMMUNITY

► Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In August 2009, the rate of unemployment in Mason County was 11.7%.³

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community well-being. In Mason


- 42 people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- 38 people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- 31 people expanded their knowledge of economic development.

County, **2.14%** of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and 60-day bank card delinquency rates have increased by **1.86%**.⁴ In a one-year period (October 2008 through October 2009), **37** foreclosures were filed.⁵

Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Mason County, **14%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.⁶

OUR HEALTH

➤ The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Mason County. Figure 2. Health Risks.⁶




As a result of participation in Mason County Extension programs:¹

- **564** people made lifestyle changes to improve health.
- **125** people increase knowledge of safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.
- **1,420** people implemented practices to maintain health and well-being.

OUR FAMILIES

- ► Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Mason County families can be described as follows:²
- 4,698 families reside in the county.
- 610 families (12.9%) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is \$37,257.
- **140** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, 1,449 people in Mason County receive food stamps. The average family food stamp benefit is \$222.32 per month.⁷

In the county, **34** children live in out-of-home care.⁸

In 2005, there were **75** incidents of adult abuse and **65** incidents of child abuse.⁹

As a result of participation in Mason County Extension programs:¹

- 144 adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- 86 people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- 25 people increased their knowledge and skills related to parenting and personal relationships.
