



SPOTLIGHT ON...

MAKING BENEFICIAL LIFESTYLE CHOICES

CCreary County citizens had the opportunity to participate in two 12-week programs that promoted physical activity and healthy weight management through Extension's "Get Moving" and "Weight, The Reality Series" programs. Mc-Creary County Extension partnered with the county health department to offer this program, which included weekly weigh-ins, physical activity and educational sessions, as well as weekly incentives. Twenty-three people participated in the program, with 15 completing the entire 12 weeks. Five people reached the goal of losing at least 7 percent of their body weight during the program. A total of 206 pounds were lost, representing an average weight

loss of 6.33 pounds per person. Positive behavioral changes, including eating breakfast daily and controlling food portions, were reported by 85 percent of participants.¹





OUR COMMUNITY

Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In August 2009, the rate of unemployment in McCreary County was 14%.³

Mortgage and bank card delinguency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community wellbeing. In McCreary County, 2.11% of


- **15** people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- 15 people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- 10 people expanded their knowledge of economic development.

mortgages are 90-days delinguent and 60-day bank card delinguency rates have increased by 2.39%.⁴ In a one-year period (October 2008 through October 2009), 8 foreclosures were filed.⁵

Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In McCreary County, **24%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.⁶

OUR HEALTH

The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in McCreary County. Figure 2. Health Risks.6





As a result of participation in **McCreary County Extension programs:**¹

- 150 people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- 50 people increase knowledge of safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.
- 50 people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR FAMILIES

- Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, McCreary County families can be described as follows:²
- 4,756 families reside in the county.
- 1,244 families (26.1%) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is **\$22,261**.
- 190 grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, 2,651 people in **McCreary County** receive food stamps. The average family food stamp benefit is **\$207.20** per month.7

In the county, 2 children live in out-of-home care.8

In 2005, there were **34** incidents of adult abuse and 151 incidents of child abuse.9

As a result of participation in McCreary County Extension programs:¹

- 200 adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- **150** people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- 100 people increased their knowledge and skills related to parenting and personal relationships.
