



MAKING BENEFICIAL LIFESTYLE CHOICES

he health of citizens of the Commonwealth of Kentucky and Menifee County in particular was a high priority for Family and Consumer Sciences Extension. One example of this effort was to offer a program called "Weight, the Reality Series" in order to address health concerns associated with being overweight and/or obese. Ten people participated in the program. Nearly one-third of the participants succeeded in losing at least 5% of their initial weight during the program. The average weight loss per participant was 12 pounds, and the average waist reduction was 2 inches.¹





OUR COMMUNITY

► Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In August 2009, the rate of unemployment in Menifee County was 15.3%.³

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community wellbeing. In Menifee

As a result of participation in Menifee County Extension programs:¹


- 47 people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- 376 people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- **71** people were prepared to enter the work force.

County, **7.92%** of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and 60-day bank card delinquency rates have increased by **2.49%**.⁴ In a one-year period (October 2008 through October 2009), **14** foreclosures were filed.⁵

Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Menifee County, **19%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.⁶

OUR HEALTH

► The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Menifee County. *Figure 2. Health Risks.*




As a result of participation in Menifee County Extension programs:¹

- **327** people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- **105** eople increase knowledge of safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.
- 92 people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR FAMILIES

- ▶ Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Menifee County families can be described as follows:²
- 1,900 families reside in the county.
- 441 families (23.4%) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is \$26,325.
- **74** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, **817** people in Menifee County receive food stamps. The average family food stamp benefit is **\$220.24** per month.⁷

In the county, **16** children live in out-of-home care.⁸

In 2005, there were **12** incidents of adult abuse and **29** incidents of child abuse.⁹

As a result of participation in Menifee County Extension programs:¹

- 252 adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- 29 people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- 44 people increased their knowledge and skills related to parenting and personal relationships.
