



SECURING FINANCIAL STABILITY

he recent economic downturn has resulted in increased unemployment in Montgomery County. As a result, the Family and Consumer Sciences agent worked with Community Education and three businesses to conduct eight "lunch and learn" sessions on budgeting, life insurance, home mortgages and living wills for 150 young families. In addition, 199 of our Homemakers have studied "Small Steps to Health and Wealth" to increase their knowledge of the actions they can take to improve their finances and health. And our agent serves as the Montgomery County secretary of AARP and regularly presents educational material to its 38 members.

Through that effort, we sponsored two driver's education certification courses for 95 senior citizens, resulting in an average discount of 5 percent on their auto insurance rates.¹





OUR COMMUNITY

► Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In August 2009, the rate of unemployment in Montgomery County was 13%.³

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community well-being. In Montgomery


- 316 people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- 221 people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- 515 people expanded their knowledge of economic development.

County, **3.99**% of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and 60-day bank card delinquency rates have increased by **2.54**%.⁴ In a one-year period (October 2008 through October 2009), **159** foreclosures were filed.⁵

Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Montgomery County, **14%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.⁶

OUR HEALTH

► The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Montgomery County. *Figure 2. Health Risks.*⁶




As a result of participation in Montgomery County Extension programs:¹

- **820** people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- 911 people used safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.
- **375** people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR FAMILIES

- ▶ Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Montgomery County families can be described as follows:²
- **6,435** families reside in the county.
- 802 families (12.5%) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is \$36,939.
- 254 grandparents are responsible for the care

of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, **2,100** people in Montgomery County receive food stamps. The average family food stamp benefit is **\$219.14** per month.⁷

In the county,

99 children live in out-of-home care.⁸ In 2005, there were **87** incidents of adult abuse and **76** incidents of child abuse.⁹

As a result of participation in Montgomery County Extension programs:¹

- 950 adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- 560 people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- 401 people increased their knowledge and skills related to parenting and personal relationships.
