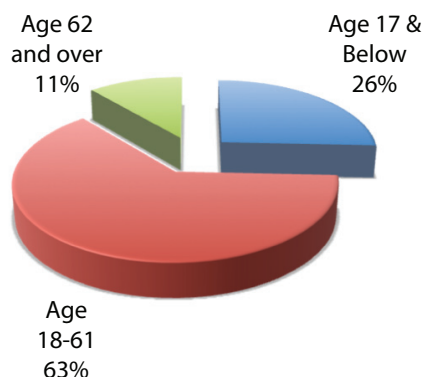

► 2008 estimates from the 2000 U.S. Census reported total population as **37,477**.<sup>2</sup> The graph on the right indicates the percentage by age group.



## SPOTLIGHT ON...

## ACCESSING NUTRITIOUS FOOD

A cooking school was offered by the Nelson County Family and Consumer Sciences agent to help at-risk youth who participate at the local Communicare Impact program learn basic kitchen skills. A total of 35 young people ranging in ages from 8 to 15 were divided into two classes. Each class completed a two-hour lesson for eight months that focused on using kitchen tools, measuring ingredients, reading labels, reading and following recipes, and preparing healthy foods and snacks. Food safety, including proper hand washing, was also emphasized. Eighty-five percent of participants reported they took the practices learned in cooking class home and were doing them in their own kitchens.<sup>1</sup>



## OUR COMMUNITY

► Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In August 2009, the rate of unemployment in Nelson County was **11.3%**.<sup>3</sup>

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community well-being. In Nelson County, **2.92%** of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and 60-day bank card delinquency rates have increased by **1.37%**.<sup>4</sup> In a one-year period (October 2008 through October 2009), **186** foreclosures were filed.<sup>5</sup>

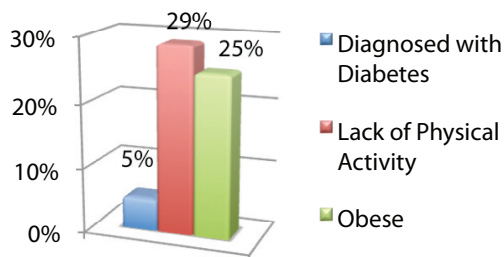
Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Nelson County, **10%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.<sup>6</sup>

### As a result of participation in Nelson County Extension programs:<sup>1</sup>

- **185** people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- **50** people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- **62** people expanded their knowledge of economic development.

## OUR HEALTH

► The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Nelson County.

### As a result of participation in Nelson County Extension programs:<sup>1</sup>

- **125** people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- **260** people developed skills to access affordable food.
- **345** people implemented practices to maintain health and well-being.

## OUR FAMILIES

► Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Nelson County families can be described as follows:<sup>2</sup>

- **10,267** families reside in the county.
- **1,034** families (**10%**) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is **\$44,600**.
- **363** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, **2,178** people in Nelson County receive food stamps. The average family food stamp benefit is **\$222.42** per month.<sup>7</sup>

In the county, **73** children live in out-of-home care.<sup>8</sup>

In 2005, there were **122** incidents of adult abuse and **98** incidents of child abuse.<sup>9</sup>

### As a result of participation in Nelson County Extension programs:<sup>1</sup>

- **484** adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- **80** people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- **30** adult or child care providers increased their knowledge and skills related to age appropriate care.
