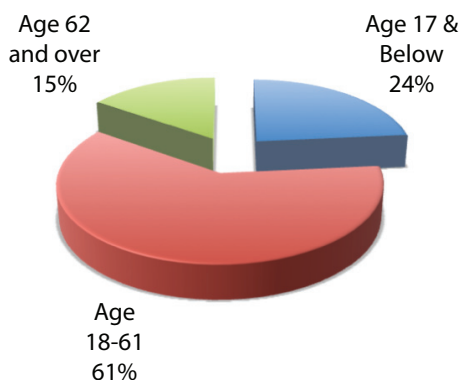

► 2008 estimates from the 2000 U.S. Census reported total population as **22,916**.² The graph on the right indicates the percentage by age group.



SPOTLIGHT ON...

ACCESSING NUTRITIOUS FOOD

The Ohio County Nutrition Education Program paraprofessional taught 39 limited-resource families how to serve more nutritious meals, to keep foods safe, and to utilize local food resources effectively. Of those families, 95.7 percent reported improvements in the nutritional quality of their diets, while 52 percent consumed a diet of higher quality because they planned meals using the MyPyramid food guide and "Nutrition Facts" labels. Also as a result of our efforts, 42 percent of families surveyed learned to plan meals and use a grocery list to guide food choices, 70 percent began feeding their children breakfast and 43 percent reported increased frequency of moderate physical activity for 30 minutes per day. Forty-eight percent of those families were able to use community food resources less often due to better food resource management.¹



OUR COMMUNITY

► Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In August 2009, the rate of unemployment in Ohio County was **10.2%**.³

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community well-being. In Ohio County, **1.13%** of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and 60-day bank card delinquency rates have increased by **1.22%**.⁴ In a one-year period (October 2008 through October 2009), **63** foreclosures were filed.⁵

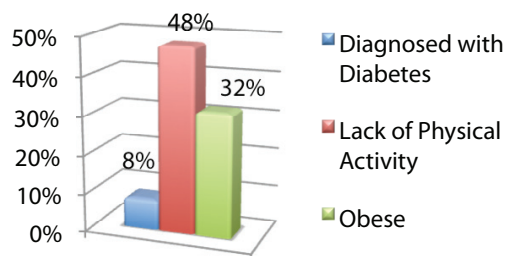
Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Ohio County, **14%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.⁶

As a result of participation in Ohio County Extension programs:¹

- **260** people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- **54** people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- **298** people were prepared to enter the work force.

OUR HEALTH

► The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Ohio County.

As a result of participation in Ohio County Extension programs:¹

- **2,550** people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- **1,500** people increase knowledge of safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.
- **780** people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR FAMILIES

► Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Ohio County families can be described as follows:²

- **6,587** families reside in the county.
- **919** families (**13.9%**) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is **\$34,970**.
- **213** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, **1,739** people in Ohio County receive food stamps. The average family food stamp benefit is **\$219.53** per month.⁷

In the county, **49** children live in out-of-home care.⁸

In 2005, there were **108** incidents of adult abuse and **146** incidents of child abuse.⁹

As a result of participation in Ohio County Extension programs:¹

- **1,225** adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- **95** people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- **105** people increased their knowledge and skills related to parenting and personal relationships.
