

MAKING BENEFICIAL LIFESTYLE CHOICES

ccording to the Kentucky Risk Assessment (2004), one of Rockcastle County's most prevalent risk factors for premature death is the high incidence of obesity. Thirty-seven percent of Rockcastle County adults are obese, in comparison to 29 percent statewide and 24 percent nationally. During fall 2008 we offered "The Biggest Loser" program to our citizens. The 11-week program was based on Extension's "Weight, The Reality Series" curriculum. Twenty-eight people completed the program, which included weekly educational and exercise sessions. By the end, participants had lost a total of 313

pounds. The participant with the highest percent of weight loss lost 31.6 pounds, which equals 13 percent of her body weight. Fifteen attendees have continued to meet each week at the Extension office for exercise and weigh-ins.¹





OUR COMMUNITY

► Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In August 2009, the rate of unemployment in Rockcastle County was 13.9%.³

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community wellbeing. In Rockcastle


- 42 people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- 40 people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- 5 people expanded their knowledge of economic development.

County, **3.48%** of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and 60-day bank card delinquency rates have increased by **1.79%**.⁴ In a one-year period (October 2008 through October 2009), **43** foreclosures were filed.⁵

Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Rockcastle County, **16%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.⁶

OUR HEALTH

► The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Rockcastle County. *Figure 2. Health Risks.*⁶




As a result of participation in Rockcastle County Extension programs:¹

- **990** people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- **245** people increase knowledge of safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.
- **200** people increased their use of radon testers, smoke detectors, fire extinguishers, and other devices to ensure personal safety.

OUR FAMILIES

- ▶ Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Rockcastle County families can be described as follows:²
- 4,763 families reside in the county.
- •911 families (19.1%) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is \$30,278.
- 172 grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, 1,638 people in Rockcastle County receive food stamps. The average family food stamp benefit is \$213.61 per month.⁷

In the county, **54** children live in out-of-home care.⁸

In 2005, there were **39** incidents of adult abuse and **45** incidents of child abuse.⁹

As a result of participation in Rockcastle County Extension programs:¹

- 31 people increased their knowledge and skills related to parenting and personal relationships.
- 116 adults and youth improved practical living skills.
- 112 youth gained one or more life skills.
