

SECURING FINANCIAL STABILITY

ussell County Family and Consumer Sciences sponsored a series of six weekly sessions of Extension's "Small Steps to Health and Wealth" program. Our goal was to tackle the problem of obesity and other health issues related to inactivity and poor nutrition, as well as to address the financial health of people living "paycheck to paycheck." Fifty-five people attended, half of who attended all six sessions. Topics covered during the 10-week program include "Make a Commitment," "Track You Current Behavior," "Think Balance, Not Sacrifice," "Put Your Mind

to It,""Automate Good Habits" and "Live the Power of 10." Several individuals requested workbooks to complete the program by self-study at home. All handouts and were made available to the public on the county Web site.1

OUR COMMUNITY

► Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In August 2009, the rate of unemployment in Russell County was 11%.³

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community wellbeing. In Russell

As a result of participation in Russell County Extension programs:¹


- 40 people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- 25 people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- Russell County Extension is involved in 5 community coalitions.

County, **3.29%** of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and 60-day bank card delinquency rates have increased by **2.46%**.⁴ In a one-year period (October 2008 through October 2009), **51** foreclosures were filed.⁵

Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Russell County, **17%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.⁶

OUR HEALTH

► The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Russell County. Figure 2. Health Risks.⁶




As a result of participation in Russell County Extension programs:¹

- **310** people increase knowledge of safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.
- **150** people developed skills to access affordable food.
- **250** people increased their use of radon testers, smoke detectors, fire extinguishers, and other devices to ensure personal safety.

OUR FAMILIES

- ► Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Russell County families can be described as follows:²
- 4,796 families reside in the county.
- 987 families (20.4%) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is \$27,803.
- **152** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, 1,788 people in Russell County receive food stamps. The average family food stamp benefit is \$194.55 per month.⁷

In the county, **34** children live in out-of-home care.⁸

In 2005, there were **109** incidents of adult abuse and **18** incidents of child abuse.⁹

As a result of participation in Russell County Extension programs:¹

- 210 adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- 100 people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- **50** people increased their knowledge and skills related to parenting and personal relationships.
