



SPOTLIGHT ON...

MAKING BENEFICIAL LIFESTYLE CHOICES

he Shelby County Family and Consumer Sciences agent and 4-H assistant presented the nutrition education program "Healthy Eating-Healthy You" to 434 fourth- and fifth-grade students. The students were encouraged to eat breakfast, choose healthy snacks and nutritious drinks, and eat five servings of fruits and vegetables each day. Following the presentation, each student wrote down one new nutrition fact to share with family and friends. A follow-up survey of 266 students revealed that 89 percent were eating breakfast, 54 percent were eating at least five servings of fruits and vegeta-

bles, 89 percent were choosing nutritious drinks and 68 percent were choosing healthy snacks. Several teachers requested that the program be presented each year to help ensure their students' health and school success.¹





OUR COMMUNITY

► Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In August 2009, the rate of unemployment in Shelby County was 10%.³

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community well-being. In Shelby

As a result of participation in Shelby County Extension programs:¹


- 109 people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- 179 people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- 106 people expanded their knowledge of economic development.

County, **2.25%** of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and 60-day bank card delinquency rates have increased by **1.31%**.⁴ In a one-year period (October 2008 through October 2009), **230** foreclosures were filed.⁵

Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Shelby County, **12%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.⁶

OUR HEALTH

➤ The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Shelby County. Figure 2. Health Risks.⁶




As a result of participation in Shelby County Extension programs:¹

- **2,092** people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- **599** people increase knowledge of safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.
- **352** people implemented practices to maintain health and well-being.

OUR FAMILIES

- ► Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Shelby County families can be described as follows:²
- 9,121 families reside in the county.
- 597 families (6.5%) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is \$52,764.
- **229** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, 1,742 people in Shelby County receive food stamps. The average family food stamp benefit is \$225.43 per month.⁷

In the county, **81** children live in out-of-home care.⁸

In 2005, there were **70** incidents of adult abuse and **93** incidents of child abuse.⁹

As a result of participation in Shelby County Extension programs:¹

- 685 adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- 40 people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- **355** people increased their knowledge and skills related to parenting and personal relationships.
