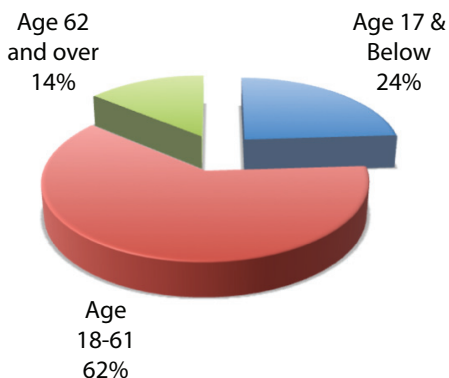

Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **10,491** contacts with Simpson County families during 2008-2009.<sup>1</sup>

## MAKING BENEFICIAL LIFESTYLE CHOICES

Programming to address the issues of declining health and the onset of chronic diseases, is a priority of the Simpson County Extension Council, the Homemakers Advisory Council, and the Family and Consumer Sciences Council. As a result, we presented “Weight, The Reality Series,” a nine-week program that emphasizes behavior change, to 17 participants. At the conclusion, those participants had lost an average of five pounds each and reduced their waist circumference by 1.14 inches. A follow-up survey indicates participants are continuing to practice the behaviors they learned. Eighty-six percent have improved their diet, 71 percent have maintained weight loss or continued to lose weight, 57 percent monitor their weight at least weekly and have made physical activity part of their routine, and 43 percent have improved their health.<sup>1</sup>



## OUR COMMUNITY

► Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In August 2009, the rate of unemployment in Simpson County was **12.3%**.<sup>3</sup>

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community well-being. In Simpson County, **2.83%** of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and 60-day bank card delinquency rates have increased by **3.10%**.<sup>4</sup> In a one-year period (October 2008 through October 2009), **1** foreclosures were filed.<sup>5</sup>

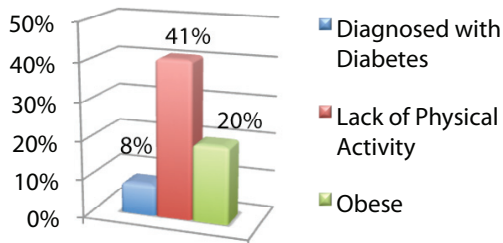
Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Simpson County, **12%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.<sup>6</sup>

### As a result of participation in Simpson County Extension programs:<sup>1</sup>

- **327** people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- **45** people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- **47** people expanded their knowledge of economic development.

## OUR HEALTH

► The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Simpson County. **Figure 2. Health Risks.**<sup>6</sup>



### As a result of participation in Simpson County Extension programs:<sup>1</sup>

- **1,925** people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- **108** people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- **107** people developed skills to access affordable food.

## OUR FAMILIES

► Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Simpson County families can be described as follows:<sup>2</sup>

- **4,637** families reside in the county.
- **396** families (**8.5%**) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is **\$42,525**.
- **166** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, **931** people in Simpson County receive food stamps. The average family food stamp benefit is **\$227.46** per month.<sup>7</sup>

In the county, **27** children live in out-of-home care.<sup>8</sup>

In 2005, there were **82** incidents of adult abuse and **43** incidents of child abuse.<sup>9</sup>

### As a result of participation in Simpson County Extension programs:<sup>1</sup>

- **1,442** adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- **316** people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- **100** people increased their knowledge and skills related to parenting and personal relationships.
