

SPOTLIGHT ON...

ACCESSING NUTRITIOUS FOOD

he Wayne County Nutrition Education Program paraprofessional taught 47 limited-resource families how to serve more nutritious meals, to keep foods safe, and to utilize local food resources effectively. Of those families, 100 percent made an improvement in the nutritional quality of their diets and 92 percent consumed a diet of higher quality because they planned meals using the MyPyramid food guide, considered healthy choices and used the Nutrition Facts label. In addition, 89 percent of families increased the frequency of moderate physical activity for 30 minutes per day, 84 percent began feeding their children breakfast, 100 percent demonstrated

an improvement in safe food handling practices and hand washing behavior, and 99 percent learned to plan meals ahead of time and use a grocery list to guide food selections.¹





OUR COMMUNITY

Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In August 2009, the rate of unemployment in Wayne County was 13.7%.³

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community well-being. In Wayne

As a result of participation in Wayne County Extension programs:¹


- **47** people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- **50** people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- 24 people expanded their knowledge of economic development.

County, **4.60%** of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and 60-day bank card delinquency rates have increased by **1.67%**.⁴ In a one-year period (October 2008 through October 2009), **31** foreclosures were filed.⁵

Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Wayne County, **19%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.⁶

OUR HEALTH



As a result of participation in Wayne County Extension programs:¹

- **235** people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- **350** people implemented practices to maintain health and well-being.
- **350** people increased their use of radon testers, smoke detectors, fire extinguishers, and other devices to ensure personal safety.

OUR FAMILIES

- ► Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Wayne County families can be described as follows:²
- 5,812 families reside in the county.
- 1,439 families (24.6%) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is **\$24,869**.
- **253** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, **2,261** people in Wayne County receive food stamps. The average family food stamp benefit is **\$188.32** per month.⁷

In the county, **47** children live in out-of-home care.⁸

In 2005, there were **65** incidents of adult abuse and **49** incidents of child abuse.⁹

As a result of participation in Wayne County Extension programs:¹

- **135** adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- **153** people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- **520** people increased their knowledge and skills related to parenting and personal relationships.
