
Figure 1. Population by Age Group² (n=12,866) Age 62 Age 17 & and over Below 2008 estimates 17% 21% from the 2000 U.S. Census reported total population as 12,866.2 The graph on the right indicates Age the percentage 18-61 by age group. 62%

SPOTLIGHT ON...

SECURING FINANCIAL STABILITY

White the current economy, many people need to make their money go further. Job loss and unemployment are concerns for many Caldwell County families, and creating a budget can help lessen those worries through use of careful planning. The 4-H Agent, Family and Consumer Sciences Agent, local financial institutions, and Family Resource Center presented "Dollars and Sense" to encourage greater dialogue about personal finances. This program gave low-income individuals the opportunity to ask financial representatives

about their money, learn basic budgeting skills, how to be a savvy shopper, and how to keep a checkbook. Ninety-six percent of participants reported their knowledge of money management had increased after completing the program.¹





OUR COMMUNITY

Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In July 2010, the rate of unemployment in Caldwell County was 8.8%.⁶

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community well-being. In Caldwell County, **2.4%** of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and **1.8%** of bank cards

As a result of participation in Caldwell County Extension programs:¹


- **110** people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- **58** people were prepared to enter the work force.
- **125** people expanded their knowledge of economic development.
- Caldwell County Extension is involved in **6** community coalitions.

are 60-days delinquent.⁷ In a one-year period (August 2009 through August 2010), **36** foreclosures were filed.⁵

Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Caldwell County, **13%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.⁸

OUR HEALTH

► The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Caldwell County. *Figure 2. Health Risks.*^{*}



As a result of participation in Caldwell County Extension programs:¹

- **100** people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- **98** people used safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.
- 73 people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR FAMILIES

- ► Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Caldwell County families can be described as follows:²
- 3,801 families reside in the county.
- 467 families (12.2%) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is \$35,258.
- **168** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, **830** people in Caldwell County receive supplemental nutrition assistance. The average family benefit is **\$236.02** per month.³

In the county, **14** children live in out-of-home care. There were **15**

child victims of substantiated abuse.⁴ There were **66** incidents of adult abuse.⁵

As a result of participation in Caldwell County Extension programs:¹

- **35** of food stamp recipients or eligible recipients enrolled in the nutrition education program improved their diet.
- **35** people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- **90** adults and youth improved practical living skills.
