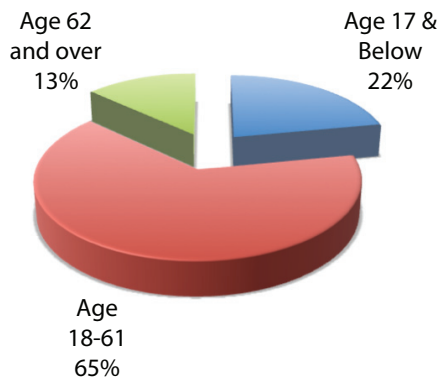

► 2008 estimates from the 2000 U.S. Census reported total population as **47,687**.² The graph on the right indicates the percentage by age group.



SPOTLIGHT ON...

NURTURING FAMILIES

Fathers are extremely important to the economic and social development of children. The Franklin County Extension Office partnered with the Franklin County Career Development Center to teach incarcerated fathers how to become nurturing dads to their children and develop healthy relationships with their children's mothers - even though they are away. This class met for 12 weeks. Participants reported that the experience and educational information they received helped them be better fathers and positively impacted their lives. The Center has requested that the course be taught again in the fall, and an informational video was produced which incorporated the views of the fathers about this program.¹



OUR COMMUNITY

► Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In July 2010, the rate of unemployment in Franklin County was **8.6%**.⁶

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community well-being. In Franklin County, **4.2%** of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and **1.0%** of bank cards are 60-days delinquent.⁷ In a one-year period (August 2009 through August 2010), **252** foreclosures were filed.⁵

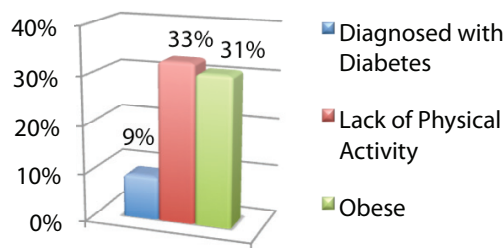
Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Franklin County, **11%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.⁸

As a result of participation in Franklin County Extension programs:¹

- **210** people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- **158** increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- **480** people expanded their knowledge of economic development.
- Franklin County Extension is involved in **45** community coalitions.

OUR HEALTH

► The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Franklin County. **Figure 2. Health Risks.**⁸



As a result of participation in Franklin County Extension programs:¹

- **500** people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- **170** people increased knowledge of safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.
- **580** people increased their use of radon testers, smoke detectors, fire extinguishers, and other devices to ensure personal safety.

OUR FAMILIES

► Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Franklin County families can be described as follows:²

- **12,839** families reside in the county.
- **891** families (**6.9%**) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is **\$51,052**.
- **378** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, **2,940** people in Franklin County receive supplemental nutrition assistance. The average family benefit is **\$255.74** per month.³

In the county, **72** children live in out-of-home care. There were **115**

child victims of substantiated abuse.⁴ There were **152** incidents of adult abuse.⁵

As a result of participation in Franklin County Extension programs:¹

- **1,200** adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- **500** people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- **600** adults and youth improved practical living skills.
