

SPOTLIGHT ON...

MAKING BENEFICIAL LIFESTYLE CHOICES

ccording to the Centers for Disease Control, Kentucky is ranked seventh-highest in the nation for adult obesity. Fulton County alone has an obesity rate of nearly 30%. To help reduce the number of obese adults, the Fulton County Cooperative Extension Service sponsored a ten-week weightloss program called "Biggest Blue Loser." Twenty-one teams with eighty-seven individuals participated in this program. During the learning sessions, par-

ticipants were taught the importance of physical activity, portion control, and label reading in order to lose weight and live healthier. At the conclusion of the program, a total of 668 pounds had been lost, with the biggest loser shedding a total of 62.7 pounds.¹





OUR COMMUNITY

Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In July 2010, the rate of unemployment in Fulton County was 12.3%.⁶

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community well-being. In Fulton County, **3.3%** of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and **2.1%** of bank cards

As a result of participation in Fulton County Extension programs:¹


- **36** people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- **12** people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- **10** people were prepared to enter the work force.
- Fulton County Extension is involved in **4** community coalitions.

are 60-days delinquent.⁷ In a one-year period (August 2009 through August 2010), **27** foreclosures were filed.⁵

Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Fulton County, **17%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.⁸

OUR HEALTH

► The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Fulton County. *Figure 2. Health Risks.*^{*}



As a result of participation in Fulton County Extension programs:¹

- **127** people implemented new practices to maintain health and well-being.
- **156** people increased knowledge of safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.
- 151 people made lifestyle changes to improve health.

OUR FAMILIES

- ► Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Fulton County families can be described as follows:²
- 2,115 families reside in the county.
- 424 families (20.1%) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is \$30,788.
- **102** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, **946** people in Fulton County receive supplemental nutrition assistance. The average family benefit is **\$207.35** per month.³

In the county, **44** children live in out-of-home care. There were **15**

child victims of substantiated abuse.⁴ There were **28** incidents of adult abuse.⁵

As a result of participation in Fulton County Extension programs:¹

- **42** adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- **30** people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- **40** adults and youth improved practical living skills.
