



Figure 1. Population by Age Group² (n=39,041)





ACCESSING NUTRITIOUS FOOD

essamine County Cooperative Extension Office provided a series of educational opportunities to families who deal with poverty and hunger on a daily basis, collaborating with Jessamine County School Family and Youth Service Centers and the local Drug Court Program for Speedy, Healthy and On the Go. This two-month series helped families plan low-cost, nutritious meals in order to maximize the nutritional value of their diets. This program, with 85% attendance, brought together local school system leaders and local and state-elected officials

to combat hunger in the community. Additionally, after four years, Jessamine County instituted a summer feeding program, and in one week alone, served a free lunch to over 275 children.1





OUR COMMUNITY

► Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In July 2010, the rate of unemployment in Jessamine County was 8.8%.6

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community well-being. In Jessamine County, 3.9% of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and 1.5% of bank cards are 60-days delin-

As a result of participation in Jessamine County Extension programs:¹


- 1,421 people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- 170 people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- 310 people expanded their knowledge of economic development.
- Jessamine County Extension is involved in 24 community coalitions.

quent.⁷ In a one-year period (August 2009 through August 2010), **318** foreclosures were filed.⁵

Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Jessamine County, **12%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.⁸

OUR HEALTH

➤ The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Jessamine County. *Figure 2. Health Risks.**



As a result of participation in Jessamine County Extension programs:¹

- **7,800** people implemented new practices to maintain health and well-being.
- **9,000** people increased knowledge of safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.
- **2,000** people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR FAMILIES

- ▶ Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Jessamine County families can be described as follows:²
- 10,657 families reside in the county.
- 902 families (8.4%) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is \$46,152.
- **265** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, **2,456** people in Jessamine County receive supplemental nutrition assistance. The average family benefit is **\$283.10** per month.³

In the county, **96** children live in out-of-home care. There were **136**

child victims of substantiated abuse.⁴ There were **216** incidents of adult abuse.⁵

As a result of participation in Jessamine County Extension programs:¹

- 3,010 adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- 125 people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- 75 people increased their knowledge and skills related to parenting and personal relationships.
