

2008 estimates from the 2000 U.S. Census reported total population as 14,390.² The graph on the right indicates the percentage by age group.




SPOTLIGHT ON...

ACCESSING NUTRITIOUS FOOD

he Cooperative Extension Service, in collaboration with other organizations, presented "Recipe for Life," a family project for 261 fifthgrade students and families using family meals to advance the essential life skills of literacy and nutrition. Students improved social skills by working in small groups and learned to read and prepare recipes. Each student submitted a family recipe and story that was placed in a "Recipe for Life" cookbook. Four months after the project parents attested that the program helped their families reap the lasting ben-

efits of preparing and eating meals together; 53% indicated children were more willing to help in the kitchen, 61% of the children had helped prepare a recipe for their family, and 69% planned more family meals together.1





OUR COMMUNITY

Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In July 2010, the rate of unemployment in Pendleton County was **11.4%**.⁶

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community well-being. In Pendleton County, **4.0%** of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and **2.5%** of bank cards are 60-days delin-


- **698** people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- **365** people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- 786 people expanded their knowledge of economic development.
- Pendleton County Extension is involved in **3** community coalitions.

quent.⁷ In a one-year period (August 2009 through August 2010), **85** foreclosures were filed.⁵

Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Pendleton County, **11%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.⁸

OUR HEALTH

The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Pendleton County. Figure 2. Health Risks.⁸



As a result of participation in Pendleton County Extension programs:¹

- **5,123** people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- **1,065** people increased knowledge of safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.
- 1,753 people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR FAMILIES

- Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Pendleton County families can be described as follows:²
- 3,971 families reside in the county.
- **390** families (**9.8%**) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is \$42,589.
- **193** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, **945** people in Pendleton County receive supplemental nutrition assistance. The average family benefit is **\$268.00** per month.³

In the county, **22** children live in out-of-home care. There were **51**

child victims of substantiated abuse.⁴ There were **36** incidents of adult abuse.⁵

As a result of participation in Pendleton County Extension programs:¹

- **1,123** adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- **1,932** adults and youth improved practical living skills.
- **276** people increased their knowledge and skills related to parenting and personal relationships.
