



Figure 1. Population by Age Group² (n=29,390)






SPOTLIGHT ON...

EMBRACING LIFE AS YOU AGE

n 2007, Perry County was ranked one of the least healthy counties in the state by the Kentucky Institute of Medicine. It also has an aging population, with 13% age 65 or above. To address the health issues of older adults, the Extension Service worked with Leslie County Extension, other community agencies, and specialists to provide 121 participants with relevant, useful topics: active aging, fall prevention, adaptive clothing, top six cancers and when to screen, flu information, diabetes, estate planning,

signs of stroke, importance of mammogram screening, and medications and interactions. Lunch was sponsored by the Extension Services and the local hospital, using recipes that were altered to reduce sodium, fat, and sugar.1





OUR COMMUNITY

► Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In July 2010, the rate of unemployment in Perry County was **10.8%**.6

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community well-being. In Perry County, 1.1% of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and 1.2% of bank cards are 60-days delin-


- 100 people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- **57** people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- 10 people expanded their knowledge of economic development.
- Perry County Extension is involved in 20 community coalitions.

quent.⁷ In a one-year period (August 2009 through August 2010), **84** foreclosures were filed.⁵

Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Perry County, **18%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.⁸

OUR HEALTH

► The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Perry County. *Figure 2. Health Risks.**



As a result of participation in Perry County Extension programs:¹

- **1,899** people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- **913** people increased knowledge of safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.
- **160** people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR FAMILIES

- ► Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Perry County families can be described as follows:²
- 8,493 families reside in the county.
- 2,244 families (26.1%) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is \$26,718.
- **380** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, **4,623** people in Perry County receive supplemental nutrition assistance. The average family benefit is **\$225.21** per month.³

In the county, 177 children live in out-of-home care. There were 154

child victims of substantiated abuse.⁴ There were **90** incidents of adult abuse.⁵

As a result of participation in Perry County Extension programs:¹

- 945 adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- 1,314 adults and youth improved practical living skills.
- 27 people increased their knowledge and skills related to parenting and personal relationships.
