



Figure 1. Population by Age Group² (n=16,582)






SPOTLIGHT ON...

PROMOTING HEALTHY HOMES AND COMMUNITIES

n 2009 Family and Consumer Sciences Agents hosted the 12th annual Holiday Cooking School, a holistic program in which participants are educated on healthier recipes, ways to save money, balance time demands, and the need to go green. According to research, the average family increases waste production by 25% during the holidays, resulting in approximately 25 million tons more landfill garbage. Out of 250 attendees, 171 returned the written evaluation. As a direct result of the environmental

focus, 38% of the evaluations stated they now understand the importance of going green for the holidays; 36% learned new ways to reduce holiday waste. 92% learned new healthy recipes; 77% learned new holiday decorating ideas.1





OUR COMMUNITY

► Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In July 2010, the rate of unemployment in Rockcastle County was **11.0%**.6

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community well-being. In Rockcastle County, 1.7% of mortgages are 90-days delinquent and 1.8% of bank cards are 60-days delin-


- 54 people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- 31 people increased their knowledge of governmental process.
- 18 people expanded their knowledge of economic development.
- Rockcastle County Extension is involved in 9 community coalitions.

quent.⁷ In a one-year period (August 2009 through August 2010), **44** foreclosures were filed.⁵

Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Rockcastle County, **16**% of the people under age 65 are uninsured.⁸

OUR HEALTH

► The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Rockcastle County. *Figure 2. Health Risks.**



As a result of participation in Rockcastle County Extension programs:¹

- **302** people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- **299** people increased knowledge of safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.
- **200** people increased their use of radon testers, smoke detectors, fire extinguishers, and other devices to ensure personal safety.

OUR FAMILIES

- ▶ Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Rockcastle County families can be described as follows:²
- 4,763 families reside in the county.
- •911 families (19.1%) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is \$30,278.
- 172 grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, **1,745** people in Rock-castle County receive supplemental nutrition assistance. The average family benefit is **\$248.64** per month.³

In the county, 72 children live in out-of-home care. There were 57

child victims of substantiated abuse.⁴ There were **47** incidents of adult abuse.⁵

As a result of participation in Rockcastle County Extension programs:¹

- 218 adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- **255** adults and youth improved practical living skills.
- 12 people increased their knowledge and skills related to parenting and personal relationships.
