

as 22,094.2 The graph on the right indicates the percentage by age group.



besity—specifically childhood obesity—is a preventable problem linked to diseases such as diabetes. To teach children the benefits of healthy eating, nutrition habits, and physical activity, Rowan County Extension followed the Exploring My-Pyramid with Professor Popcorn curriculum. Of the 800 grade-school students, 425 learned that hands should be washed after sneezing and using the bathroom and before eating. Additionally, 375 were able to identify two or more examples from each of the

food groups. After the program, 150 now eat different kinds of vegetables; 180 eat different kinds of fruits most days. 150 now eat whole grains. 225 almost always wash their hands before they eat; 150 get more physical activity.1





OUR COMMUNITY

Unemployment rates are a key economic indicator. In July 2010, the rate of unemployment in Rowan County was 9.1%.⁶

Mortgage and bank card delinquency rates and foreclosure filings are important financial indicators of community well-being. In Rowan County, **2.9%** of mortgages are 90-days delinguent

As a result of participation in Rowan County Extension programs:¹


- **70** people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- **100** people expanded their knowledge of economic development.
- Rowan County Extension is involved in **13** community coalitions.

and **2.3%** of bank cards are 60-days delinquent.⁷ In a oneyear period (August 2009 through August 2010), **55** foreclosures were filed.⁵

Access to health insurance is another important factor contributing to family well-being. In Rowan County, **16%** of the people under age 65 are uninsured.⁸

OUR HEALTH

The health of our people contributes to quality of life. The chart below illustrates health risks of adults in Rowan County. Figure 2. Health Risks.⁸



As a result of participation in Rowan County Extension programs:¹

- **400** people increased knowledge of practices to maintain health and well-being.
- **70** people increased knowledge of safe practices to store, handle, and prepare food.
- 50 people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR FAMILIES

- ► Using data from the 2000 U.S. Census, Rowan County families can be described as follows:²
- 5,216 families reside in the county.
- 838 families (15.9%) live below poverty level.
- Median family income is **\$34,338**.
- **115** grandparents are responsible for the care of their grandchildren.



According to the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, **2,042** people in Rowan County receive supplemental nutrition assistance. The average family benefit is **\$225.21** per month.³

In the county, **143** children live in out-of-home care. There were **147**

child victims of substantiated abuse.⁴ There were **46** incidents of adult abuse.⁵

As a result of participation in Rowan County Extension programs:¹

- **310** adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- **100** people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and/or increase savings.
- **210** adults and youth improved practical living skills.
