OUR FOCUS


Family and Consumer Sciences Extension is committed to improving the quality of life for individuals and families in Calloway County. As the current economic situation continues to create challenges, educational programs focus on:

- Making Healthy Lifestyle Choices that influence health and well-being
- **Nurturing Families** as they cope with fewer resources and more demands
- Embracing Life as We Age to strive for independence longer
- Securing Financial Stability in a turbulent economic period
- Promoting Healthy Homes and Communities to recycle, reduce waste, and protect our environment
- Accessing Nutritious Food that is affordable, available and safe
- Empowering Community Leaders as we all work to sustain and improve our communities.

In 2010-2011, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **8,361** contacts with Calloway County individuals and families.²

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

EMPOWERING COMMUNITY LEADERS

Basic life skills can help youth save money and increase their ability to become independent adults in the future. Clothing leaders and the Calloway County Family and Consumer Sciences Agent have taught "Learn to Sew" classes for ages 6 to 16. Participants learn to use a sewing machine and serger, repair clothing, and coordinate fabrics and thread. Final garments are completed for judging and the Fashion Revue. The number of volunteer clothing leaders supporting the program has increased from 9 to 23, resulting in \$15,640 in volunteer time contributions. This year 91 youth registered for the program, 66 continued after registration, 30 completed their project and 26 participated in 4-H Fashion Revue.



OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 Census,¹ of families in Calloway County with their own children...

- 71.0% are husband-wife families
- 29.0% are single parent families

In addition, there are:

- 15,530 households
- **3,851** households with 1 or more persons under the age of 18
- 420 grandchildren under 18 years old who live with a grandparent householder
- **3,940** households with at least one person age 65 and over



As a result of participation in Calloway County Extension programs:²

- 468 people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- 23 people increased knowledge of parenting and personal relationships.
- **756** people increased knowledge of safe storage, handling and food preparation.

OUR COMMUNITY

In 2009, the most recent data available, the median household income in Calloway County was \$34,947.3

The number of children in poverty in Calloway County was **1,493** compared to **1,218** in 2006.³

The total number of people receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in Calloway County is **4,385** in 2011.⁴

As a result of participation in Calloway County Extension programs:²

- **475** people increased leadership knowledge and skills.
- 1,112 people improved communication skills to address community issues.
- **706** people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR ECONOMY

According to the 2010 American Community Survey 5-year estimates, between 2005 and 2009 in Calloway County it is estimated that...


- **51.6%** (+/- **3**) are married-couple families with both husband and wife in the labor force
- **73.5**% (+/- **8.4**) are children under 6 years old with all parents in the labor force
- **8.7%** (+/- **2.4**) are people 65 years and over below poverty level during the past 12 months

As a result of participation in Calloway County Extension programs:²

- **66** people increased knowledge of economic and enterprise development.
- 976 people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and increase savings.
- **2,055** people demonstrated increased practical living skills.
