OUR FOCUS

Family and Consumer Sciences Extension is committed to improving the quality of life for individuals and families in Floyd County. As the current economic situation continues to create challenges, educational programs focus on:

- Making Healthy Lifestyle Choices that influence health and well-being
- Nurturing Families as they cope with fewer resources and more demands
- Embracing Life as We Age to strive for independence longer
- Securing Financial Stability in a turbulent economic period
- Promoting Healthy Homes and Communities to recycle, reduce waste, and protect our environment

In 2010-2011, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **13,460** contacts with Floyd County individuals and families.²

entucky's high number of adults diagnosed with diabetes reinforces the need for research-based programs and outreach. Using newly developed curriculum, Family and Consumer Sciences Agent taught Floyd County diabetics food preparation and management skills in taking ownership of their Type II diabetes. One participant stated, "It's easy to forget (at my stage of the disease) that I need to watch my food intake and types of food, because I don't want to have the complications that come with diabetes later in life. The ongoing series gives me incentive to stay on track." Another participant stated, "I have lowered my blood sugar levels." Participants took an active role in the recruitment of program participants, program promotion, and support groups planning.



OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 Census,¹ of families in Floyd County with their own children...

- 66.2% are husband-wife families
- **33.8%** are single parent families

In addition, there are:

- 16,060 households
- **5,185** households with 1 or more persons under the age of 18
- **1,006** grandchildren under 18 years old who live with a grandparent householder
- **4,050** households with at least one person age 65 and over

As a result of participation in Floyd County Extension programs:²

- **895** people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- **375** people increased knowledge of parenting and personal relationships.
- **220** people increased knowledge of safe storage, handling and food preparation.

OUR COMMUNITY

In 2009, the most recent data available, the median household income in Floyd County was **\$29,725**.³

The number of children in poverty in Floyd County was **3,790** compared to **3,856** in 2006.³

The total number of people receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in Floyd County is **13,653** in 2011.⁴

As a result of participation in Floyd County Extension programs:²

- **310** people increased leadership knowledge and skills.
- **579** people improved communication skills to address community issues.
- **534** people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR ECONOMY

According to the 2010 American Community Survey 5-year estimates,⁶ between 2005 and 2009 in Floyd County it is estimated that...


- **32.7%** (+/- **4.2**) are married-couple families with both husband and wife in the labor force
- **46.2%** (+/- **9.2**) are children under 6 years old with all parents in the labor force
- 12.7% (+/- 3.7) are people 65 years and over below poverty level during the past 12 months

As a result of participation in Floyd County Extension programs:²

- **112** people increased knowledge of economic and enterprise development.
- **101** people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and increase savings.
- **532** people demonstrated increased practical living skills.
