OUR FOCUS


Family and Consumer Sciences Extension is committed to improving the quality of life for individuals and families in Grant County. As the current economic situation continues to create challenges, educational programs focus on:

- Making Healthy Lifestyle Choices that influence health and well-being
- **Nurturing Families** as they cope with fewer resources and more demands
- Embracing Life as We Age to strive for independence longer
- Securing Financial Stability in a turbulent economic period
- Promoting Healthy Homes and Communities to recycle, reduce waste, and protect our environment
- Accessing Nutritious Food that is affordable, available and safe
- Empowering Community Leaders as we all work to sustain and improve our communities.

In 2010-2011, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **8,200** contacts with Grant County individuals and families.²

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

MAKING HEALTHY LIFESTYLE CHOICES

he rise in adult and youth obesity in the state and county sparked the need to initiate the Grant County Biggest Winner Challenge sponsored by the Fitness For Life Around Grant County Coalition. The Cooperative Extension Agents served as co-chairs of this county wide event. The goal of this challenge is to encourage physical activity and healthy lifestyle choices. The program, in its sixth year, offers family activities such as square dance, game nights, martial arts, jump rope, and warrior training. This year, 250 participants reported a total weight loss of 234.4 pounds and total fat loss of 61.9 %. One participant stated "I hope to continue and try to lose more weight and stay healthy for my children and for myself."



OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 Census,¹ of families in Grant County with their own children...

- 67.3% are husband-wife families
- 32.7% are single parent families

In addition, there are:

- 8,614 households
- 3,574 households with 1 or more persons under the age of 18
- 749 grandchildren under 18 years old who live with a grandparent householder
- 1,931 households with at least one person age 65 and over



As a result of participation in Grant County Extension programs:²

- **450** people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- **316** adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- **300** people increased knowledge of safe storage, handling and food preparation.

OUR COMMUNITY

In 2009, the most recent data available, the median household income in Grant County was \$42,814.3

The number of children in poverty in Grant County was **1,780** compared to **1,352** in 2006.³

The total number of people receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in Grant County is **5,747** in 2011.⁴

As a result of participation in Grant County Extension programs:²

- **62** people increased leadership knowledge and skills.
- **104** people improved communication skills to address community issues.
- 25 people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR ECONOMY

According to the 2010 American Community Survey 5-year estimates, between 2005 and 2009 in Grant County it is estimated that...


- **55.3%** (+/- **4.8**) are married-couple families with both husband and wife in the labor force
- **61.2%** (+/- **9.4**) are children under 6 years old with all parents in the labor force
- 7.7% (+/- 3.2) are people 65 years and over below poverty level during the past 12 months

As a result of participation in Grant County Extension programs:²

- 312 people increased knowledge of economic and enterprise development.
- 108 people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and increase savings.
- **20** people demonstrated increased practical living skills.
