OUR FOCUS


Family and Consumer Sciences Extension is committed to improving the quality of life for individuals and families in Harrison County. As the current economic situation continues to create challenges, educational programs focus on:

- Making Healthy Lifestyle Choices that influence health and well-being
- **Nurturing Families** as they cope with fewer resources and more demands
- Embracing Life as We Age to strive for independence longer
- Securing Financial Stability in a turbulent economic period
- Promoting Healthy Homes and Communities to recycle, reduce waste, and protect our environment
- Accessing Nutritious Food that is affordable, available and safe
- Empowering Community Leaders as we all work to sustain and improve our communities.

In 2010-2011, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **18,681** contacts with Harrison County individuals and families.²

MAKING HEALTHY LIFESTYLE CHOICES

ne third of farm families, the unemployed, and those employed part-time have no health insurance. To help these individuals, local organizations, with the Family and Consumer Sciences Extension Agent, sponsor the Community Health Fair to provide annual preventative health screenings. This years' event included 35 educational exhibits. 15 medical screenings and 7 physicians available for consultation. Of 485 registered participants, 401 had blood tests and 14 other screenings valued at over \$1,200 per person. In the ten year history of the project cholesterol levels have decreased from 71% had elevated levels in 199 to 45% in 2011. Over the years individuals have credited the health fair with saving their life. Without this program many would not see a physician or participate in screenings.



OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 Census,¹ of families in Harrison County with their own children...

- 68.8% are husband-wife families
- 31.2% are single parent families

In addition, there are:

- 7,343 households
- **2,521** households with 1 or more persons under the age of 18
- 446 grandchildren under 18 years old who live with a grandparent householder
- **2,007** households with at least one person age 65 and over



As a result of participation in Harrison County Extension programs:²

- **2,200** people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- **1,000** people increased knowledge of parenting and personal relationships.
- **1,300** people increased knowledge of safe storage, handling and food preparation.

OUR COMMUNITY

In 2009, the most recent data available, the median household income in Harrison County was \$42,415.3

The number of children in poverty in Harrison County was **1,237** compared to **881** in 2006.³

The total number of people receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in Harrison County is **3,706** in 2011.⁴

As a result of participation in Harrison County Extension programs:²

- **550** people increased leadership knowledge and skills.
- **1,200** people improved communication skills to address community issues.
- **750** people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR ECONOMY

According to the 2010 American Community Survey 5-year estimates,⁶ between 2005 and 2009 in Harrison County it is estimated that...


- **53.6%** (+/- **5.3**) are married-couple families with both husband and wife in the labor force
- **55.8%** (+/- **12.9**) are children under 6 years old with all parents in the labor force
- 17.9% (+/- 5.2) are people 65 years and over below poverty level during the past 12 months

As a result of participation in Harrison County Extension programs:²

- **2,100** people increased knowledge of economic and enterprise development.
- **1,000** people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and increase savings.
- **1,500** people demonstrated increased practical living skills.
