OUR FOCUS


Family and Consumer Sciences Extension is committed to improving the quality of life for individuals and families in McCracken County. As the current economic situation continues to create challenges, educational programs focus on:

- Making Healthy Lifestyle Choices that influence health and well-being
- **Nurturing Families** as they cope with fewer resources and more demands
- Embracing Life as We Age to strive for independence longer
- Securing Financial Stability in a turbulent economic period
- Promoting Healthy Homes and Communities to recycle, reduce waste, and protect our environment
- Accessing Nutritious Food that is affordable, available and safe
- Empowering Community Leaders as we all work to sustain and improve our communities.

In 2010-2011, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **2,295** contacts with McCracken County individuals and families.²

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

SECURING FINANCIAL STABILITY

he McCracken County Family and Consumer Science Agents partner each St. Patrick's Day to host "Spring into Green," which over 50 adults attended. This year, the speaker addressed money and estate planning. As a result, 94% were motivated to make a change; 92% will consider plans for their estate; 79% plan to start saving; 88% will use tips learned when deciding to update or sell their home; 84% learned the first thing to do if they lose their job; and 94% learned the best thing to do if they lose their job or have a reduction in salary. Participants ranked their knowledge of estate planning before and after the presentation. 24% of participants reported having "little" knowledge before the program, whereas 92% reported "some" knowledge after the program.



OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 Census,¹ of families in McCracken County with their own children...

- 63.4% are husband-wife families
- 36.6% are single parent families

In addition, there are:

- 28,227 households
- **8,208** households with 1 or more persons under the age of 18
- 1,118 grandchildren under 18 years old who live with a grandparent householder
- **7,940** households with at least one person age 65 and over



As a result of participation in McCracken County Extension programs:²

- **1,400** people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- **1,150** people increased knowledge of parenting and personal relationships.
- **520** people increased knowledge of safe storage, handling and food preparation.

OUR COMMUNITY

In 2009, the most recent data available, the median household income in McCracken County was \$40,976.3

The number of children in poverty in McCracken County was **3,592** compared to **3,447** in 2006.³

The total number of people receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in McCracken County is **11,017** in 2011.⁴

As a result of participation in McCracken County Extension programs:²

- **1,050** people increased leadership knowledge and skills.
- **950** people improved communication skills to address community issues.
- **55** people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR ECONOMY

According to the 2010 American Community Survey 5-year estimates, between 2005 and 2009 in McCracken County it is estimated that...


- 45.4% (+/- 2.6) are married-couple families with both husband and wife in the labor force
- **65.3%** (+/- **6.9**) are children under 6 years old with all parents in the labor force
- 9.1% (+/- 1.8) are people 65 years and over below poverty level during the past 12 months

As a result of participation in McCracken County Extension programs:²

- **275** people increased knowledge of economic and enterprise development.
- 650 people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and increase savings.
- 900 people demonstrated increased practical living skills.
