OUR FOCUS


Family and Consumer Sciences Extension is committed to improving the quality of life for individuals and families in McCreary County. As the current economic situation continues to create challenges, educational programs focus on:

- Making Healthy Lifestyle Choices that influence health and well-being

- Embracing Life as We Age to strive for independence longer
- Securing Financial Stability in a turbulent economic period

In 2010-2011, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **3,107** contacts with McCreary County individuals and families.²

MAKING HEALTHY LIFESTYLE CHOICES

ccording to www.countyhealthrankings.org, 43% of Mc-Creary County citizens are in poor or fair health and 31% of adults are obese. On the financial side of things, more than half of U.S. households are believed to live paycheck to paycheck. In McCreary County, the unemployment rate is 14.1%; 51% of children live in poverty. As a result of these numbers, the McCreary County Family and Consumer Sciences Agent offered the "Small Steps to Health and Wealth" program. The program was split into six one-hour sessions. Eight participants attended all sessions. Several topics dealing with financial and physical well-being were presented, and all participants made positive comments about changes made as a result of those sessions. This program has already been requested for another session.



OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 Census,¹ of families in McCreary County with their own children...

- 67.2% are husband-wife families
- 32.8% are single parent families

In addition, there are:

- **6,477** households
- **2,202** households with 1 or more persons under the age of 18
- 507 grandchildren under 18 years old who live with a grandparent householder
- **1,696** households with at least one person age 65 and over



As a result of participation in McCreary County Extension programs:²

- 135 people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- 5 people increased knowledge of parenting and personal relationships.
- **56** people increased knowledge of safe storage, handling and food preparation.

OUR COMMUNITY

In 2009, the most recent data available, the median household income in McCreary County was \$23,163.3

The number of children in poverty in McCreary County was **2,047** compared to **2,004** in 2006.³

The total number of people receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in McCreary County is **6,761** in 2011.⁴

As a result of participation in McCreary County Extension programs:²

- **14** people increased leadership knowledge and skills.
- **14** people improved communication skills to address community issues.
- 32 people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR ECONOMY

According to the 2010 American Community Survey 5-year estimates,⁶ between 2005 and 2009 in McCreary County it is estimated that...


- **36.2%** (+/- **6.2**) are married-couple families with both husband and wife in the labor force
- **52.7%** (+/- **15**) are children under 6 years old with all parents in the labor force
- 24.3% (+/- 9.2) are people 65 years and over below poverty level during the past 12 months

As a result of participation in McCreary County Extension programs:²

- **45** people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- **16** people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and increase savings.
- 22 adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
