OUR FOCUS


Family and Consumer Sciences

In 2010-2011, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **10,239** contacts with Mercer County individuals and families.²

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

SECURING FINANCIAL STABILITY

ith ten percent of Mercer County families living below the poverty level and 163 grandparents caring for grandchildren, financial planning, and literacy are important to the community. Mercer County Extension Agents worked with local banks, funeral homes, and financial advisers to offer three major programs. Serving more than 120 individuals, programs covered QuickBooks®, estate planning, and investments. Estate-planning survey results show that 88% of the participants did not have an estate-planning team, and 78% did not have an estate plan. In its second year, the estate-planning series will be offered based on these survey results and feedback from the Agriculture Advisory Council, which confirms ongoing need for information on this topic.



OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 Census,¹ of families in Mercer County with their own children...

- 70.2% are husband-wife families
- 29.8% are single parent families

In addition, there are:

- 8,682 households
- **2,850** households with 1 or more persons under the age of 18
- 449 grandchildren under 18 years old who live with a grandparent householder
- **2,455** households with at least one person age 65 and over



As a result of participation in Mercer County Extension programs:²

- **413** people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- 175 people increased knowledge of parenting and personal relationships.
- 116 people increased knowledge of safe storage, handling and food preparation.

OUR COMMUNITY

In 2009, the most recent data available, the median household income in Mercer County was \$44,256.³

The number of children in poverty in Mercer County was **1,121** compared to **1,006** in 2006.³

The total number of people receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in Mercer County is **3,688** in 2011.⁴

As a result of participation in Mercer County Extension programs:²

- **191** people increased leadership knowledge and skills.
- **401** people improved communication skills to address community issues.
- 62 people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR ECONOMY

According to the 2010 American Community Survey 5-year estimates,⁶ between 2005 and 2009 in Mercer County it is estimated that...


- **53.8%** (+/- **3.6**) are married-couple families with both husband and wife in the labor force
- **60.1%** (+/- **11.6**) are children under 6 years old with all parents in the labor force
- 9.4% (+/- 3.1) are people 65 years and over below poverty level during the past 12 months

As a result of participation in Mercer County Extension programs:²

- **61** people increased knowledge of economic and enterprise development.
- 330 people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and increase savings.
- **530** people demonstrated increased practical living skills.
