OUR FOCUS


Family and Consumer Sciences

In 2010-2011, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **27,649** contacts with Montgomery County individuals and families.²

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

EMBRACING LIFE AS WE AGE

ccording to recent census data, 12.9% of the people in Montgomery County are over 65 years of age. The Montgomery County Family and Consumer Sciences Agent has partnered with other agencies to share educational information with seniors. With AARP Extension has sponsored driver's education classes, programs on long-term care insurance, senior travel safety, community medical care, and understanding Medicare. 210 homemaker members have studied "Safer Housing for the Elderly" and "Don't Let Falls Get You Down." The FCS Agent serves on the Kentucky Cancer Consortium. In 1999 only 34.7% of Kentuckians had colon cancer screening, compared to 63.7% in 2008. Local efforts for colon cancer education have included homemaker fact sheets, health fairs, and involvement with local and regional cancer committees.



OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 Census,¹ of families in Montgomery County with their own children...

- 66.8% are husband-wife families
- 33.2% are single parent families

In addition, there are:

- 10,435 households
- 3,657 households with 1 or more persons under the age of 18
- 701 grandchildren under 18 years old who live with a grandparent householder
- **2,485** households with at least one person age 65 and over



As a result of participation in Montgomery County Extension programs:²

- **679** people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- 175 people increased knowledge of parenting and personal relationships.
- **434** people increased knowledge of safe storage, handling and food preparation.

OUR COMMUNITY

In 2009, the most recent data available, the median household income in Montgomery County was \$32,964.3

The number of children in poverty in Montgomery County was **1,714** compared to **1,313** in 2006.³

The total number of people receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in Montgomery County is **6,121** in 2011.⁴

As a result of participation in Montgomery County Extension programs:²

- **687** people increased leadership knowledge and skills.
- **406** people improved communication skills to address community issues.
- 550 people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR ECONOMY

According to the 2010 American Community Survey 5-year estimates, between 2005 and 2009 in Montgomery County it is estimated that...


- 47.8% (+/- 4.3) are married-couple families with both husband and wife in the labor force
- **54%** (+/- **10**) are children under 6 years old with all parents in the labor force
- 21.1% (+/- 6.6) are people 65 years and over below poverty level during the past 12 months

As a result of participation in Montgomery County Extension programs:²

- **291** people increased knowledge of economic and enterprise development.
- 350 people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and increase savings.
- **1,003** people demonstrated increased practical living skills.
