OUR FOCUS


Family and Consumer Sciences Extension is committed to improving the quality of life for individuals and families in Morgan County. As the current economic situation continues to create challenges, educational programs focus on:

In 2010-2011, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **25,506** contacts with Morgan County individuals and families.²

MAKING HEALTHY LIFESTYLE CHOICES

merican Heart Association, American Diabetes Association, and USDA endorse consumption of fish and seafood for a healthier diet. Many rural Kentuckians eat fish that is fried, batter-fried, breaded, or deep fried. Morgan County Family and Consumer Sciences Agent offered a program that communicated the health benefits of eating fish and seafood, addressed concerns, and shared techniques for purchasing, storing, and preparing fish or seafood. Sixty-four leaders and nearly 1,000 Extension Homemakers were trained. Survey results showed that 50% plan to increase fish consumption; 100% had learned a health benefit of fish. 80% said their consumption concerns were answered. 89% gained knowledge in the purchase, selection, and storage of fish and seafood. 49% have purchased "Kentucky Proud" fish products.



OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 Census,¹ of families in Morgan County with their own children...

- 72.9% are husband-wife families
- 27.1% are single parent families

In addition, there are:

- 4,860 households
- 1,578 households with 1 or more persons under the age of 18
- 250 grandchildren under 18 years old who live with a grandparent householder
- 1,313 households with at least one person age 65 and over



As a result of participation in Morgan County Extension programs:²

- 975 people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- 454 people increased knowledge of parenting and personal relationships.
- **186** people increased knowledge of safe storage, handling and food preparation.

OUR COMMUNITY

In 2009, the most recent data available, the median household income in Morgan County was \$29,473.3

The number of children in poverty in Morgan County was **1,042** compared to **1,028** in 2006.³

The total number of people receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in Morgan County is **3,746** in 2011.⁴

As a result of participation in Morgan County Extension programs:²

- 1,117 people increased leadership knowledge and skills.
- **1,015** people improved communication skills to address community issues.
- 239 people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR ECONOMY

According to the 2010 American Community Survey 5-year estimates,⁶ between 2005 and 2009 in Morgan County it is estimated that...


- **44.2%** (+/- **6.5**) are married-couple families with both husband and wife in the labor force
- **46.7%** (+/- **15.7**) are children under 6 years old with all parents in the labor force
- **16.3%** (+/- **5**) are people 65 years and over below poverty level during the past 12 months

As a result of participation in Morgan County Extension programs:²

- 42 people increased knowledge of economic and enterprise development.
- 283 people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and increase savings.
- **409** people demonstrated increased practical living skills.
