OUR FOCUS

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

MAKING HEALTHY LIFESTYLE CHOICES

ccording to the 2009 U.S. Census, 21% of Nelson County youth live in poverty. Using SNAP-Ed resources, Extension partnered with Communicare to provide nutrition education and meal preparation classes to 45 emotionally and behaviorally disturbed children. Over eight months, children learned about food groups, portion sizes, and proper hand-washing. Nutrition lessons preceded food preparation and eating. Children were given recipes and cooking tools to foster interest in healthy cooking. At the end of the year, youth invited family to a meal they prepared. Communicare employees noticed that children no longer needed to be prompted to wash their hands before and after meals. Parents reported children were willing to help cook, try foods, and choose healthy ingredients.



OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 Census,¹ of families in Nelson County with their own children...

- 64.9% are husband-wife families
- **35.1%** are single parent families

In addition, there are:

- 16,826 households
- **6,159** households with 1 or more persons under the age of 18
- **788** grandchildren under 18 years old who live with a grandparent householder
- **3,560** households with at least one person age 65 and over



As a result of participation in Nelson County Extension programs:²

- **152** people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- **105** people increased knowledge of parenting and personal relationships.
- 441 people increased knowledge of safe storage, handling and food preparation.

OUR COMMUNITY

In 2009, the most recent data available, the median household income in Nelson County was **\$43,498**.³

The number of children in poverty in Nelson County was **2,296** compared to **1,671** in 2006.³

The total number of people receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in Nelson County is **7,305** in 2011.⁴

As a result of participation in Nelson County Extension programs:²

- **294** people increased leadership knowledge and skills.
- **567** people improved communication skills to address community issues.
- **110** people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR ECONOMY

According to the 2010 American Community Survey 5-year estimates,⁶ between 2005 and 2009 in Nelson County it is estimated that...


- **55.2%** (+/- **2.7**) are married-couple families with both husband and wife in the labor force
- **70.1%** (+/- **5.9**) are children under 6 years old with all parents in the labor force
- **13.9%** (+/- **5.6**) are people 65 years and over below poverty level during the past 12 months

As a result of participation in Nelson County Extension programs:²

- 228 people increased knowledge of economic and enterprise development.
- 71 people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and increase savings.
- **925** people demonstrated increased practical living skills.
