### **OUR FOCUS**


Family and Consumer Sciences Extension is committed to improving the quality of life for individuals and families in Nicholas County. As the current economic situation continues to create challenges, educational programs focus on:

In 2010-2011, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **7,971** contacts with Nicholas County individuals and families.<sup>2</sup>

### ACCESSING NUTRITIOUS FOOD

ecently, the Bluegrass Region was rated by "Men's Health" magazine as having the poorest health habits in the nation. To address this issue, Nicholas and Robertson County Cooperative Extension Service partnered with Blue Licks State Park to provide a regional farmers market. The market participates in the WIC Farmers Market program, allowing low-income families the opportunity to buy local fruits and vegetables. Family and Consumer Sciences Agents provided samples of fresh produce, offered recipes, and education on preparing local produce. Redeemed WIC vouchers have increased by 2% in 2010 over 2011. Farm businesses directly benefit by selling produce straight from farm to table, while families have an opportunity to increase intake of locally grown fruit and vegetables.



#### **OUR FAMILIES**

According to the 2010 Census,<sup>1</sup> of families in Nicholas County with their own children...

- 67.7% are husband-wife families
- 32.3% are single parent families

#### In addition, there are:

- 2,809 households
- 977 households with 1 or more persons under the age of 18
- 201 grandchildren under 18 years old who live with a grandparent householder
- **795** households with at least one person age 65 and over



### As a result of participation in Nicholas County Extension programs:<sup>2</sup>

- **50** people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- **50** people increased knowledge of safe storage, handling and food preparation.

#### **OUR COMMUNITY**

In 2009, the most recent data available, the median household income in Nicholas County was \$36,910.<sup>3</sup>

The number of children in poverty in Nicholas County was **479** compared to **356** in 2006.<sup>3</sup>

The total number of people receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in Nicholas County is **1,660** in 2011.<sup>4</sup>

### As a result of participation in Nicholas County Extension programs:<sup>2</sup>

- **80** people increased leadership knowledge and skills.
- **100** people improved communication skills to address community issues.
- **70** people developed skills to access affordable food.

### **OUR ECONOMY**

According to the 2010 American Community Survey 5-year estimates,<sup>6</sup> between 2005 and 2009 in Nicholas County it is estimated that...


- 51% (+/- 6.3) are married-couple families with both husband and wife in the labor force
- **65.7%** (+/- **13.4**) are children under 6 years old with all parents in the labor force
- 22.1% (+/- 7.9) are people 65 years and over below poverty level during the past 12 months

## As a result of participation in Nicholas County Extension programs:<sup>2</sup>

- 5 people increased knowledge of economic and enterprise development.
- **5** people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and increase savings.
- **100** people demonstrated increased practical living skills.
