OUR FOCUS


Family and Consumer Sciences Extension is committed to improving the quality of life for individuals and families in Pike County. As the current economic situation continues to create challenges, educational programs focus on:

- Making Healthy Lifestyle Choices that influence health and well-being
- **Nurturing Families** as they cope with fewer resources and more demands
- Embracing Life as We Age to strive for independence longer
- Securing Financial Stability in a turbulent economic period
- Promoting Healthy Homes and Communities to recycle, reduce waste, and protect our environment
- Accessing Nutritious Food that is affordable, available and safe
- Empowering Community Leaders as we all work to sustain and improve our communities.

In 2010-2011, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **15,723** contacts with Pike County individuals and families.²

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

MAKING HEALTHY LIFESTYLE CHOICES

ike County's poor health is linked to obesity and a lack of physical activity. "Weight: the Reality Series," a 10-week program sponsored by Family and Consumer Sciences in partnership with YMCA, helped adults learn to make lifestyle changes that lead to weight loss and reduced risk of diseases related to obesity. If participants continued to exercise at YMCA, they received a five-week pass to the gym. Over 150 pounds total was lost. The class reported that other family members have lost weight as a result of healthier meal preparation. Participants continue to exercise and have lost weight since class ended. One participant reported she now controls her health by eating healthier and exercising one hour a day.



OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 Census,¹ of families in Pike County with their own children...

- 70.5% are husband-wife families
- 29.5% are single parent families

In addition, there are:

- 26,728 households
- **8,505** households with 1 or more persons under the age of 18
- 1,571 grandchildren under 18 years old who live with a grandparent householder
- **6,780** households with at least one person age 65 and over



As a result of participation in Pike County Extension programs:²

- **2,644** people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- **105** people increased knowledge of parenting and personal relationships.
- **1,375** people increased knowledge of safe storage, handling and food preparation.

OUR COMMUNITY

In 2009, the most recent data available, the median household income in Pike County was \$32,258.3

The number of children in poverty in Pike County was **4,511** compared to **4,053** in 2006.³

The total number of people receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in Pike County is **16,619** in 2011.⁴

As a result of participation in Pike County Extension programs:²

- **1,400** people increased leadership knowledge and skills.
- **1,050** people improved communication skills to address community issues.
- 1245 adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.

OUR ECONOMY

According to the 2010 American Community Survey 5-year estimates, between 2005 and 2009 in Pike County it is estimated that...


- **36.1%** (+/- **2.1**) are married-couple families with both husband and wife in the labor force
- **43.3**% (+/- **6.1**) are children under 6 years old with all parents in the labor force
- 14.2% (+/- 2.9) are people 65 years and over below poverty level during the past 12 months

As a result of participation in Pike County Extension programs:²

- **575** people increased knowledge of economic and enterprise development.
- 20 people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and increase savings.
- **704** people demonstrated increased practical living skills.
