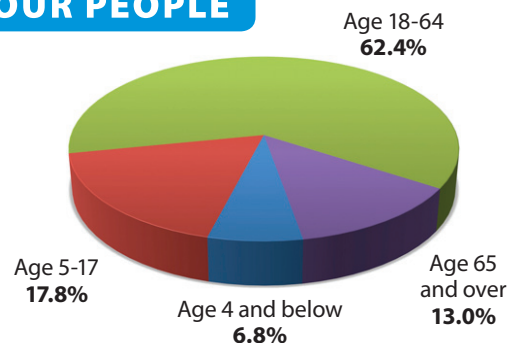
- **Making Healthy Lifestyle Choices** that influence health and well-being

In 2010-2011, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **9,878** contacts with Powell County individuals and families.²

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

MAKING HEALTHY LIFESTYLE CHOICES

According to Kentucky Institute on Medicine, substance abuse is a major risk factor in Kentucky. A survey indicated a need for substance abuse intervention and/or treatment programs at the local level. The Powell County Family and Consumer Sciences Agent worked with the court system, drug court coordinator, and FCS Agents in Wolfe and Breathitt Counties. The Powell agent planned and conducted an eight-week series for participants identified by the District Judge. Classes were taught by Agents in their respective counties, and covered life skills. Twenty-three people, ages 18 to 60, were mandated by the court to attend the first half. The second four classes were optional, but 100% returned. Participants expressed increased confidence in their ability to resume a positive family life and obtain employment.

OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 Census,¹ of families in Powell County with their own children...

- **65.6%** are husband-wife families
- **34.4%** are single parent families

In addition, there are:

- **4,834** households
- **1,721** households with 1 or more persons under the age of 18
- **415** grandchildren under 18 years old who live with a grandparent householder
- **1,234** households with at least one person age 65 and over



As a result of participation in Powell County Extension programs:²

- **650** people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- **500** people increased knowledge of parenting and personal relationships.
- **500** people increased knowledge of safe storage, handling and food preparation.

OUR COMMUNITY

In 2009, the most recent data available, the median household income in Powell County was **\$30,954**.³

The number of children in poverty in Powell County was **1,343** compared to **1,136** in 2006.³

The total number of people receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in Powell County is **4,416** in 2011.⁴

As a result of participation in Powell County Extension programs:²

- **100** people increased leadership knowledge and skills.
- **625** people improved communication skills to address community issues.
- **450** people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR ECONOMY

According to the 2010 American Community Survey 5-year estimates,⁶ between 2005 and 2009 in Powell County it is estimated that...

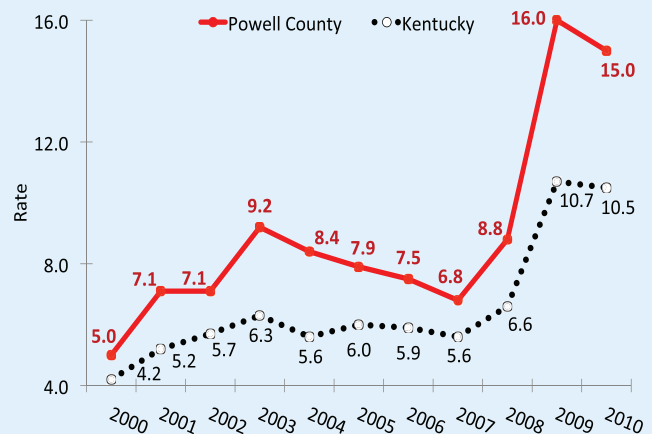
- **35.6%** (+/- **6.6**) are married-couple families with both husband and wife in the labor force
- **42.9%** (+/- **14.3**) are children under 6 years old with all parents in the labor force
- **27.8%** (+/- **11.5**) are people 65 years and over below poverty level during the past 12 months

As a result of participation in Powell County Extension programs:²

- **105** people increased knowledge of economic and enterprise development.
- **150** people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and increase savings.
- **800** people demonstrated increased practical living skills.
