OUR FOCUS


Family and Consumer Sciences

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

MAKING HEALTHY LIFESTYLE CHOICES

n 2008, Kentucky's diabetes rate was ninth highest in the U.S., and statewide, an estimated 324,000 adults have diabetes. Pulaski County has one of the highest death rates from diabetes. The Pulaski County Family and Consumer Sciences Agent worked to address this major health issue with a diabetes health expo, in collaboration with county health department, and Lake Cumberland Hospital. The health expo was held at Somerset Mall. More than 800 attended the May event and received information from 66 agencies about diabetes prevention and control. Extension provided educational materials, recipes, and snacks. Participants received information on exercising to improve health, how smoking affects diabetes, body-fat analysis, and related health topics. After the expo, the participation rate for weekly diabetes classes increased.



OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 Census,¹ of families in Pulaski County with their own children...

- 67.2% are husband-wife families
- 32.8% are single parent families

In addition, there are:

- 25,722 households
- **8,084** households with 1 or more persons under the age of 18
- 1,279 grandchildren under 18 years old who live with a grandparent householder
- **7,345** households with at least one person age 65 and over



As a result of participation in Pulaski County Extension programs:²

- 1,781 people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- **50** people increased knowledge of parenting and personal relationships.
- **928** people increased knowledge of safe storage, handling and food preparation.

OUR COMMUNITY

In 2009, the most recent data available, the median household income in Pulaski County was \$32,038.3

The number of children in poverty in Pulaski County was **3,853** compared to **3,399** in 2006.³

The total number of people receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in Pulaski County is **13,850** in 2011.⁴

As a result of participation in Pulaski County Extension programs:²

- 910 people increased leadership knowledge and skills.
- 930 people improved communication skills to address community issues.
- 231 people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR ECONOMY

According to the 2010 American Community Survey 5-year estimates, between 2005 and 2009 in Pulaski County it is estimated that...


- 43.2% (+/- 2.7) are married-couple families with both husband and wife in the labor force
- **57.4%** (+/- **6.6**) are children under 6 years old with all parents in the labor force
- **16.2%** (+/- **2.2**) are people 65 years and over below poverty level during the past 12 months

As a result of participation in Pulaski County Extension programs:²

- **100** people increased knowledge of economic and enterprise development.
- 350 people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and increase savings.
- **715** people demonstrated increased practical living skills.
