OUR FOCUS


Family and Consumer Sciences Extension is committed to improving the quality of life for individuals and families in Robertson County. As the current economic situation continues to create challenges, educational programs focus on:

In 2010-2011, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **9,553** contacts with Robertson County individuals and families.²

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

MAKING HEALTHY LIFESTYLE CHOICES

he Robertson County Family and Consumer Sciences Agent recognizes the connection between physical and financial health. In an effort to improve nutrition in Robertson County youth, the extension office developed a multi-event program. A six-week series on nutrition and exercise was taught to 39 Head Start children. Nutrition was emphasized to all 79 of 4th to 6th graders and several 4-H'ers. Two afterschool classes received nutrition education. A summer cooking class reached 43 children; several children enjoyed educational food classes at 4-H Camp. Extension Homemakers taught "Recipe for Life" to all 29 5th graders. Many parents reported knowledge gained and improvements made with their children. Health improvements in the present can mean fewer medical expenses in the future.



OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 Census,¹ of families in Robertson County with their own children...

- 74.1% are husband-wife families
- 25.9% are single parent families

In addition, there are:

- 902 households
- 289 households with 1 or more persons under the age of 18
- 46 grandchildren under
 18 years old who live with
 a grandparent householder
- 286 households with at least one person age 65 and over



As a result of participation in Robertson County Extension programs:²

- **150** people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- 45 people increased knowledge of parenting and personal relationships.
- 115 people increased knowledge of safe storage, handling and food preparation.

OUR COMMUNITY

In 2009, the most recent data available, the median household income in Robertson County was \$35,050.3

The number of children in poverty in Robertson County was **154** compared to **153** in 2006.³

The total number of people receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in Robertson County is **552** in 2011.⁴

As a result of participation in Robertson County Extension programs:²

- **20** people increased leadership knowledge and skills.
- 28 people were involved in addressing issues of their community.
- 25 people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR ECONOMY

According to the 2010 American Community Survey 5-year estimates, between 2005 and 2009 in Robertson County it is estimated that...


- **49.9**% (+/- **14.8**) are married-couple families with both husband and wife in the labor force
- **78%** (+/- **21.9**) are children under 6 years old with all parents in the labor force
- 28.4% (+/- 12.8) are people 65 years and over below poverty level during the past 12 months

As a result of participation in Robertson County Extension programs:²

- **35** adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- 10 people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and increase savings.
- **45** people demonstrated increased practical living skills.
