OUR FOCUS


Family and Consumer Sciences Extension is committed to improving the quality of life for individuals and families in Rockcastle County. As the current economic situation continues to create challenges, educational programs focus on:

OUR PEOPLE

ACCESSING NUTRITIOUS FOOD

The Rockcastle County Family Consumer Sciences Agent, in collaboration with Sigmon Farms, Rockcastle school system, health department, hospital, and conservation district, conducted the county's 18th annual Youth Farm Field Day. The theme, "Farm to Plate: Where Does Your Food Come From?" was made possible by a Healthy Communities grant through Rockcastle Health Department. A hay ride allowed youth to see vegetable and livestock production and crops that support livestock. Speakers discussed local and traditional food production with 295 fourth-grade youth from three elementary schools. The hospital, health department, and beekeepers organization provided healthy food samples, augmented by FCS Agent's \$700 grant for samples and snacks.



OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 Census,¹ of families in Rockcastle County with their own children...

- 69.9% are husband-wife families
- **30.1%** are single parent families

In addition, there are:

- 6,750 households
- **2,235** households with 1 or more persons under the age of 18
- **504** grandchildren under 18 years old who live with a grandparent householder
- 1,851 households with at least one person age 65 and over

As a result of participation in Rockcastle County Extension programs:²

- 92 people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- 12 people increased knowledge of parenting and personal relationships.
- **299** people increased knowledge of safe storage, handling and food preparation.

OUR COMMUNITY

In 2009, the most recent data available, the median household income in Rockcastle County was **\$29,654**.³

The number of children in poverty in Rockcastle County was **1,288** compared to **1,245** in 2006.³

The total number of people receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in Rockcastle County is **4,911** in 2011.⁴

As a result of participation in Rockcastle County Extension programs:²

- **85** people increased leadership knowledge and skills.
- **505** people improved communication skills to address community issues.
- **136** people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR ECONOMY

According to the 2010 American Community Survey 5-year estimates,⁶ between 2005 and 2009 in Rockcastle County it is estimated that...


- **44.5%** (+/- **5.5**) are married-couple families with both husband and wife in the labor force
- **41.8%** (+/- **10.9**) are children under 6 years old with all parents in the labor force
- **30.6%** (+/- **7.6**) are people 65 years and over below poverty level during the past 12 months

As a result of participation in Rockcastle County Extension programs:²

- 22 people increased knowledge of economic and enterprise development.
- **218** adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- **255** people demonstrated increased practical living skills.
