### OUR FOCUS


Family and Consumer Sciences Extension is committed to improving the health and well-being of individuals and families in Bell County. To help families make wise decisions our educational programs focus on:

### SPOTLIGHT ON ...

## INCREASING FRUIT AND VEGETABLE CONSUMPTION

With obesity and poor oral health issues on the rise in 2012, Bell County educators sought ways to address these issues in their classrooms. By using the LEAP (Literacy, Eating and Activity for the Primary) curriculum, the Bell County Cooperative Extension Service, partnering with Family Resource Centers, was able to reach 400 students in preschool through second grade to encourage physical fitness, proper oral health, correct hand washing, and healthy eating by picking more fruits and vegetables. One hundred percent of the students gained knowledge on the correct way to wash hands and how to brush their teeth using a circular motion for the right amount of time. Teachers reported that 85 percent of the children aspired to incorporate more physical activity into their day while at school.



## OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 American Community Survey,<sup>3</sup> between 2006 and 2010 it is estimated that in Bell County:



- **38.9% (+/- 5.8)** families with related children were below poverty
- **18.3% (+/- 3.4)** of those over the age of 65 were below poverty

### In addition:

- **25.4% (+/- 2.3)** of those ages 18-64 did not have health insurance in 2010<sup>4</sup>
- **627** children on average received Kentucky Children's Health Insurance Program (KCHIP) benefits in 2010<sup>5</sup>
- **11,311** people received Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in 2012<sup>6</sup>

### As a result of participating in Bell County Extension programs:<sup>2</sup>

- **42** people reported spending time in physical activity.
- **381** people increased their knowledge about healthy foods.
- **100** people reported eating more healthy foods.

## OUR COMMUNITY

In Bell County:

- **66.0%** of births were to mothers who received early and regular prenatal care in 2009<sup>7</sup>
- **56.0%** of ordered child support was collected in 2011<sup>8</sup>

Of the **25** primary care physicians in Bell County:<sup>9</sup>

- **4.0%** are family practice
- **12.0%** are pediatricians
- **16.0%** are OB/GYN

### As a result of participating in Bell County Extension programs:<sup>2</sup>

- **612** people are involved in addressing community issues.
- **162** people increased awareness of how to manage current economic events.
- **385** people were able to utilize new decision-making skills for health.

## OUR HEALTH


According to Kentucky Health Facts,<sup>10</sup> between 2008 and 2010 in Bell County:

- **25.7% (14.2 - 42.0)** did not pursue health care due to cost, compared to **18% (17.0 - 18.6)** in the state
- **36.2% (26.3 - 47.4)** of adults reported their health status as less than good, compared to **23% (22.0 - 23.6)** in the state
- **37.7% (28.0 - 48.5)** of adults reported having received a flu vaccine in the past year

### As a result of participating in Bell County Extension programs:<sup>2</sup>

- **441** people increased knowledge of diet and exercise changes to improve health.
- **351** people made diet or exercise changes to improve health.
- **431** people experienced a change in knowledge of healthy home practices and stress management.
