### OUR FOCUS

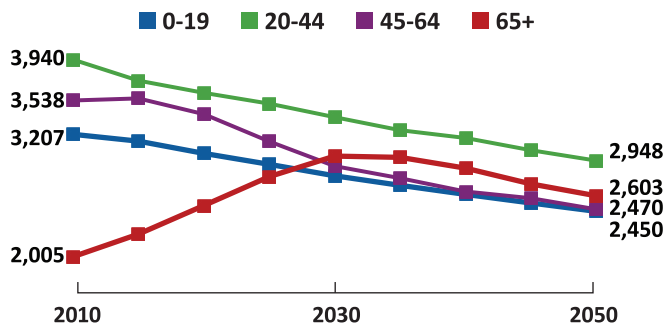
Family and Consumer Sciences Extension is committed to improving the health and well-being of individuals and families in Butler County. To help families make wise decisions our educational programs focus on:

In 2011-2012, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **3,436** contacts with Butler County individuals and families.<sup>2</sup>

## WHAT'S IN THE DOCTOR'S BAG

The "What's in the Doctor's Bag" curriculum was offered to the two Head Start classes to introduce children to the doctor's office - the doctor's instruments and what they experience when going to the doctor. The program also introduced them to a different healthy food each month and showed the benefits of eating healthy. At the beginning of the class, only 90 percent of the students would try the foods presented, with 100 percent trying them at the end of the year. The teachers observed 85 percent of the class choosing healthier snacks at snack time. At the completion of the program, students were requested to name the instruments and describe what they were used for. About 98 percent of the students could name the instruments and their purpose.



## OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 American Community Survey,<sup>3</sup> between 2006 and 2010 it is estimated that in Butler County:



- **23.2% (+/- 5.7)** families with related children were below poverty
- **20.6% (+/- 6.2)** of those over the age of 65 were below poverty

### In addition:

- **24.1% (+/- 2.3)** of those ages 18-64 did not have health insurance in 2010<sup>4</sup>
- **256** children on average received Kentucky Children's Health Insurance Program (KCHIP) benefits in 2010<sup>5</sup>
- **2,930** people received Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in 2012<sup>6</sup>

### As a result of participating in Butler County Extension programs:<sup>2</sup>

- **175** people reported spending time in physical activity.
- **378** people increased their knowledge about healthy foods.
- **378** people reported eating more healthy foods.

## OUR COMMUNITY

In Butler County:

- **55.0%** of births were to mothers who received early and regular prenatal care in 2009<sup>7</sup>
- **65.0%** of ordered child support was collected in 2011<sup>8</sup>

Of the **3** primary care physicians in Butler County:<sup>9</sup>

- **66.7%** are family practice
- **0.0%** are pediatricians
- **0.0%** are OB/GYN

### As a result of participating in Butler County Extension programs:<sup>2</sup>

- **114** people are involved in addressing community issues.
- **35** people increased awareness of how to manage current economic events.
- **693** people were able to utilize new decision-making skills for health.

## OUR HEALTH

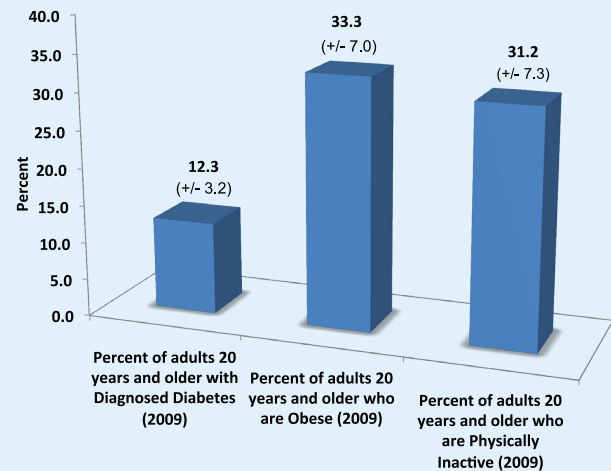
According to Kentucky Health Facts,<sup>10</sup> between 2008 and 2010 in Butler County:

- **14.7% (7.4 - 27.0)** did not pursue health care due to cost, compared to **18% (17.0 - 18.6)** in the state
- **17.5% (9.7 - 29.6)** of adults reported their health status as less than good, compared to **23% (22.0 - 23.6)** in the state
- **30.1% (19.6 - 43.3)** of adults reported having received a flu vaccine in the past year

### As a result of participating in Butler County Extension programs:<sup>2</sup>

- **797** people increased knowledge of diet and exercise changes to improve health.
- **607** people made diet or exercise changes to improve health.
- **150** people experienced a change in knowledge of healthy home practices and stress management.
