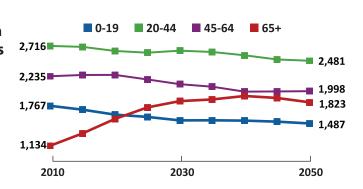

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

PROVIDING FOOD FOR THE HUNGRY

Statistics show that approximately 30 percent of Elliott County's population is at risk for food insecurity. As a result, the Elliott County Cooperative Extension Service agents for Family and Consumer Sciences and Agriculture partner with God's Pantry to host a monthly food drop. During the 2011-2012 fiscal year, 121,033 pounds of food was distributed to 1,728 households for an average of 70 pounds of food per month for 144 households. An average of 16 volunteers

worked three hours each month to help the food drop run smoothly. According to "The Independent Sector," the 2010 value of volunteer time in Kentucky was \$17.65 per hour. This gives the Elliott County Cooperative Extension Service a value of \$10,166.40 in helping feed limited-resource families for the 2011-2012 fiscal year.





OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 American Community Survey,³ between 2006 and 2010 it is estimated that in Elliott County:

- 39.4% (+/- 9.9) families with related children were below poverty
- 25.6% (+/- 9.1) of those over the age of 65 were below poverty

In addition:

- 25.8% (+/- 2.8) of those ages 18-64 did not have health insurance in 2010⁴
- 166 children on average received Kentucky Children's Health Insurance Program (KCHIP) benefits in 2010⁵
- 2,353 people received Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in 2012⁶

As a result of participating in Elliott County Extension programs:²

- 75 people reported spending time in physical activity.
- 85 people demonstrated informed decision-making skills.
- 100 people were reached with information on accessing healthy foods.

OUR COMMUNITY

In Elliott County:

- 57.0% of births were to mothers who received early and regular prenatal care in 2009⁷
- 56.0% of ordered child support was collected in 20118

Of the 2 primary care physicians in Elliott County:9

- 100.0% are family practice
- 0.0% are pediatricians
- 0.0% are OB/GYN

As a result of participating in **Elliott County Extension programs:**²

- 2,180 people reported accessing healthy community food sources such as farmers markets or food pantry.
- 23 people in Stand Up to Falling plan to be more physically active to prevent falls.
- 585 people were able to utilize new decision-making skills for health.

OUR HEALTH

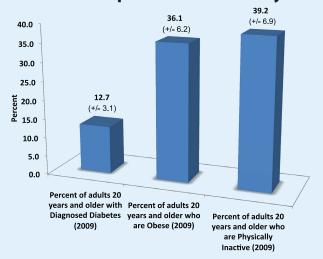
According to Kentucky Health Facts, 10 between 2008 and 2010 in Elliott County:

- 34.4% (23.2 47.8) did not pursue health care due to cost, compared to 18% (17.0 - 18.6) in the state
- 32.1% (22.2 43.9) of adults reported their health status as less than good, compared to 23% (22.0 -**23.6)** in the state
- 29.0% (19.0 41.7) of adults reported having received a flu vaccine in the past year

As a result of participating in **Elliott County Extension** programs:²

- 500 people increased knowledge of diet and exercise changes to improve health.
- **300** people made diet or exercise changes to improve health.
- 647 people experienced a change in knowledge of food safety practices.
